Georgetown Still in Intermediate O.H.A. Play-downs

Georgetown Intermediates Eliminate Port Elgin Lakesides by 13-6 Score

Goalie Evans Stars as Locals Break Even in Owen Sound — Girls Pipe Band Big Attraction — Given Dinner by City

Georgetown Intermediates earned the right to continue further into the Ontario Intermediate play-downs, by defeating the Port Elgin Lakesides 13-6, at Owen Sound last Friday night. This was the second game of the series, the first game played in Galt on the previous Tuesday, resulted in a 7-11 tie.

In the second and final game the Lakesides proved to be no match for the fast-skating Georgetown sextette, although they did put forth some good efforts and deserve much credit for the sportsmanlike way in which they accepted defeat. The game was exceptionally cleanly played and only minor penalties for the four offenders. Following the match both teams shook hands and congratulated each other.

The Owen Sound arena was filled to capacity, as Port Elgin brought over some 900 supporters, and the Georgetown team too, was well-represented by supporters, although the distance stopped many fans from seeing the game. Also noticed on the sidelines were many former Georgetownites, and friends of the team, who went to the game due to its proximity.

The high-light of the contest was the outstanding ability and clever playing of Dolly Beaumont, Georgetown's flashy right winger, who earned himself many laurels in this game. He proved to be the play-maker of the evening, and his own rushes, scoring and scoring threats delighted the 2500 hockey fans in attendance. He rightfully merits the first star of the game, and the second goes to Norm Locking of Port Elgin, an ex-pro player, whose efforts for his team are worthy of mention. Third star goes to Kenny Nash, he played a good all-round game and accounted for three goals.

Georgetown went out in the lead from the drop of the puck, with Beaumont netting the first counter at 25 seconds. Locking retaliated, but Nash, Chris and Kemshead soon offset this with three consecutive goals. Schrank added another for the Ports near the end of the frame.

The local team probably set a record when they netted three goals in the first 35 seconds of the second period. Schrank came back with one, then Hurst added another for Georgetown, and Gregg and Schrank, two more for the Lakesides. Hurst and Beaumont finished off the period with two more, and by this time any hope the Port Elgin team might have had of regaining their standing was dashed away.

Patterson, Beaumont and Hurst all added goals in the final chapter, with Port Elgin replying but once. The game in this period nearly got out of the hands of the referees, as the crowd and players both turned thumbs-down on a few of their decisions. The game was held up temporarily while the ice was cleared of programs and peanuts. Final score was Georgetown 13 — Port Elgin 6, to eliminate the Ports and let Georgetown continue further into the O.H.A. play-downs.

LESLIE CLARK TELLS OF YALTA TRIP

On Thursday evening, March 21, representatives of Equestrian Agricultural Society and of Georgetown Public and High School Staffs, met with the local rural teachers at the McGibbon Hotel.

At the close of the dinner, served at 7 p.m., Mr. H. C. Wrigglesworth, with a few well chosen remarks introduced the guest speaker, Mr. Leslie M. Clark. Les, who had many trips to various parts of the world during his service with the RCAF, chose to speak on his trip to Yalta, prior to the Conference of the "Big 3".

Taking off from Southern England and passing over the Cherbourg Peninsula, Leslie thrilled his audience with his bird's eye view of the landscape, the vast stretches of the vineyards of Southern France and the beautiful farmland generally found throughout France, and of mountainous Corsica; Rome and the Vatican City; his flight over the Apennines and down the rugged coast of Italy to Taranto; on to Athens and the Ancient Parthenon; the crossing of the Aegean Sea dotted with its myriads of islands; and then on to Yalta to await the arrival of ex-Prime Minister Churchill and the late President by plane, and Stalin by train.

A hearty vote of thanks was tendered Mr. Clark by Miss Hume for his very interesting and instructive talk. Principal Wrigglesworth then spoke briefly on the purpose of the meeting and the teachers set to work to revise the school prize list for 1946.

Goalie Lorne Evans and the Georgetown Girls' Pipe Band stole the show at Owen Sound last night, as Georgetown Intermediate "B's" went into the second round in the O.H.A. elimination contests. Parading to the arena and on the ice between periods the local "lassies" did both themselves and the town proud as they drew thunderous applause. Outstanding in the hockey fixture was goalie Evans, who was phenomenal in the first period, and played exceptionally fine hockey throughout the entire piece. None the less outstanding was McCauley in the net for the Lumber Kings, and it was due to the brilliant efforts of these players that the score kept on a very even keel.

Both teams played a wide-open brand of hockey, which gave the fans plenty of exciting moments as the teams flashed from one end of the ice to the other. The Lumber Kings were a smoother passing aggregation, but this was offset by the relentless back-checking of the Georgetown squad. The ice was rather sticky and this hindered the fast-skating Georgetown forwards. The game was very evenly contested, although the Papermakers came in for a number of penalties for minor offences, leaving them short-handed, and giving Owen Sound the advantage on the play.

The Papermakers were unable to protect a 2-goal lead earned in the first and second periods, and the Lumber Kings pulled the game out of the fire and tied the issue halfway through the third period.

Sparked by Olmsted, their flashy centre player, Owen Sound beat a path to the local net on many occasions in the first period only to be turned back by Evans. Patterson also turned in some brilliant defensive work in this period and the Papermakers were pressed to the limit in an endeavor to ward off the Kings. However, near the end of the frame, Ferri netted a fluky goal as he bashed the puck toward the net from the defense.

The Georgetown team came into their own in the second period, and carried the balance of play in this session. On the finest goal of the evening, Chris took a pass from Hurst at the blue line and went in close to beat McCauley easily. Owen Sound's first goal came when McArthur and Yeo combined on a brilliant effort.

Owen Sound pressed hard for goals again in the final period, and their efforts were rewarded when Small netted a nice goal while both teams were playing a man short. Fine defensive tactics on the part of the Papermakers at this time, staved off an onslaught of pucks and the game ended in a 2-2 tie.

Georgetown did not play their usual good brand of hockey, but relied on defensive rather than offensive efforts and seemed satisfied to come out with a tie game. On the other hand, Owen Sound was out for goals and this proved the issue in the limit.

First two stars go to the goalkeepers, and the third to Patterson of the Georgetown team, who stopped almost as many shots as Evans in the first period and was a pillar of defense for the Papermakers.

The second game in this series, goals to count, will be played in Galt arena tomorrow night, when the hockey clubs are providing a special train so that all hockey fans in town may watch their favourites in action.
