Outstanding in the bookey fixture was goalle Evans, who was phenomenal in the first-period, and played exceptionally fine ho-ckey throughout the entire piece. None the less outstanding was McCanley in the net for the Lumber Kings, and 1. was due to the brilliant efforts of these players that the score kept on a very even keel.

Both teams played a Wide-open brand of hockey, which gave the fang plenty of exciting moments as the teams flashed from one end of the toe to the other. The Lumber Kings were a smoother passing aggregation. but this was offset by the relentless backchecking of the Georgetown squad.
