Halton Seed Fair and Bacon Show

Another Outstanding Success

The Eaton Town Hall was the scene of another outstanding seed fair and bacon show on Saturday, March 16th. The event was held under the auspices of the Halton Crop Improvement Association. The entries in both sections of the show were slightly lower than a year ago, nevertheless it was an outstanding show, attractively displayed and topped off by a splendid programme of addresses. The cereal grain classes were fairly strong and represented well over 4000 bushels of grain of small quality offered for sale. A total of 43 entries were made in the oat and barley classes alone. The T. Eaton Company Special for the Champion exhibit in the seed show was won by W. E. Breckon, of Freeman, on his bushel of Erban Oats.

Eighteen Grain Club members wound up their year's activity by exhibiting in their special classes for Ajax Oats and Galore Barley. In the former club, Henk De Vries of Georgetown was high club member on the aggregate score, and in the Galore Barley Club the top award on the aggregate score went to Fraser McNabb also of Georgetown district. The latter club member was the winner of the Special award of a week's Short Course at the Improvement Assn.

The Bacon Show sponsored by the Halton Association in co-operation with the Federal Department of Agriculture and Canada Packers Ltd., was again the feature attraction of the show. Forty-four Halton Hog Producers each entered a hog for this event the latter part of February. These 44 hogs had been marketed in the usual manner, slaughtered and made into Wilshire by Canada Packers Ltd. Twenty Wilshires from as many different carcasses were on display and had been selected on the basis of those dressing closest to 150 lbs. irrespective of quality. The Grand Champion Wilshire was produced from the entry of Arthur Dickinson of Milton, with an entry of Major General W. H. Greenly of Palermo, getting reserve.

The Dickinson entry was awarded the T. Eaton Company Special. A new feature of the Bacon Show which created a great deal of interest was a hog carcass grading competition which was open to all. The awards were as follows — 1st, Stewart Miller, Georgetown; 2nd, Ed Snow, Milton; 3rd, Jack Marchmont, Hornby; 4th, Robert Miller, Georgetown.

A. T. Woodley, President of the Halton Assembly presided over the programme on Saturday afternoon. A capacity crowd greeted the speakers. Prof. W. M. Drummond, head of the Dept. of Agricultural Economics, Guelph, was the main speaker and treated his audience to a most interesting resume of the world situation with a particular reference to Canadian Agriculture.

W. S. McMullen and Elgin Senn of the Federal Department of Agriculture presented an excellent picture of the hog and bacon situation and other kindred topics. It was pointed out by Mr. McMullen that during 1945 the percentage of A's marketed in Canada had increased from 28.3 per cent in 1944 to 32.1 per cent in 1945; in Ontario from 36.5 per cent in 1944 to 39.8 per cent in 1945, and in Halton from 40.7 per cent in 1944 to 43.4 per cent in 1945. While this improvement is encouraging, stated Mr. McMullen, it still leaves much to be desired if the British market is to be retained. It was also pointed out that at the Ontario Test Station where all hogs are fed a balanced ration and marketed when at the proper weight, the percentage of A's marketed over a period of years has been 86.5 per cent. It seems logical to conclude that while Halton producers are doing a reasonably good job from the standpoint of quality of their hogs, when compared with other counties in the province, nevertheless there is no question that more attention to properly balanced rations and the weight at which they are shipped, could easily result in raising the percentage of A's marketed in Halton to at least 60 per cent.

The five top Wilshires were made from the respective entries of Arthur Dickinson, Milton; W. H. Greenly, Palermo; Miller Bros., Georgetown; H. L. Mathison, Hillsburg; and J. B. Miller, Georgetown.
