WILL BECOME MODERN
APARTMENT HOUSE**

Considerable interest has been aroused by the activity around the old John R. Barber home on Main Street South, which has been unoccupied for these past several years. The lovely old red brick house was one of the most beautiful and largest homes in the district. Untenanted, it gradually fell into disrepair, windows were broken and many of the fixtures carted off or destroyed by groups and individuals entering the mistaken custom of entering vacant homes and making free with their contents. The house is to be converted into 14 modern apartments which will include a basement apartment for a caretaker, and work has already begun to remodel the house into a new apartment building. It is hoped to have the renovations completed by October. The new apartment building will serve a double advantage to the town of relieving the acute housing shortage and of beautifying southern Main Street.
