JEAN DEAN

Jean Dean has acquired no little fame as a choral accompanist since she began accompanying the Four Gentlemen of "The Old Songs" at the piano, over two years ago. Miss Dean has a technique of playing so lightly that the quartet sounds unaccompanied. The group is heard twice a week over the CBC Trans-Canada network, Sundays, at 10:15 p.m. EST, and Fridays at 7:00 p.m. EST.

JOHN FEATHERSTONE FORD

One of the oldest and most widely known residents, Mr. John Featherstone Ford of Trafalgar Township, passed away at his late residence, 6th line on March 17th after a short illness in his 84th year. He belonged to the third generation of the early pioneers; Mr. and Mrs. Jno. Ford of Tyrone County, Ireland and Mr. and Mrs. John Featherstone of Durham County, England, who settled in this community 125 years ago, and his parents were Andrew Ford and Mary Featherstone. He was born near Omagh where he spent his boyhood and early manhood, receiving his education at Omagh Public School.

Fifty years ago he married Margaret Ellen Coyne, making a new home for themselves one mile from his birthplace, where his eldest son now resides. Born into this home were Wilbert, Clarence and Emerson living in the Community and Estelle, Reg. N., a nurse in Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton for some time. His wife predeceased him 14 years ago.

John F. Ford always had the welfare of his community and church at heart, giving his time unselfishly. When quite a young man, he connected himself with the Omagh Literary Society and Sons of Temperance, becoming an expert debater. This led him into public life. He was elected as Councillor of Trafalgar Township in 1906, serving in this capacity for several years, later being elected Reeve and again elected as Warden for Halton County. In 1919, he was elected by the U.F.O. Party to the Ontario Legislature by Halton County but unselfishly gave his seat to Hon. E. C. Drury, who became Ontario's premier. Soon after he contested in the federal election and then retired from political life.

Giving up public life, he did not relinquish his activities in his church life. When a boy, he connected himself with the church of his parents, the Omagh Methodist Church, becoming Sunday School teacher and later superintendent. Upon the closing of this church in 1906, he and his family joined up with Bethel Methodist Church, transferring his interests to that Sunday School and Church work. In 1915, on decision of that congregation to build a new church home, he was chosen chairman of the Building Committee until the church debt was paid. In 1925 Bethel became a United Church and he was elected its first elder, which office he held until his death.

During the last eight years he has spent much of his time in the home of his sister, Charlotte at Brampton, especially during the winters. While there he attended Home Church with her and taught the Bible Class in Sunday School there.

His surviving sisters are Mrs. Mary Ingelhart and Miss Matilda Ford, Burlington; Mrs. Charlotte Clark, Brampton and Mrs. Harold (Ida) Gamble, Gull Lake, Sask.

After a short service in his late home, a large number of relatives, and friends from near and far attended the public service in Bethel United Church conducted by Rev. J. O. Tilton, a former minister now of Richmond Hill. Rev. F. Ainsworth, present minister and Rev. J. A. Leese of Home Church, Miss Marjorie Dawson of Milton impressively sang "Jesus, lover of my soul."

Amid many beautiful floral tributes carried by the grandsons and the church members, Mr. Ford's mortal remains were led to rest in the family plot in Bethel Cemetery by three cousins, George Featherstone of Omagh, Charles Featherstone of Milton, T. D. Featherstone, Churchville and three nephews, Clare Ford, Milton; Alfred Ford, Omagh and Alex McKinney Jr., Brampton.
