### THE PRESTON SERIES

Georgetown Intermediates meet Preston in their second game of the series in Galt tomorrow night. Going into this game with the score against them 3-3, the Papermakers will be giving all they have in order to retrieve these lost goals, and if at all possible, stay in the play-downs. While we don't expect our boys to do the impossible, we do know they will be in there trying. Both teams are very evenly matched and we still look forward to victory and a crack at the championship. The winner of this contest will meet London, and the winners of that series will play either Orillia or Bobcaygeon in the finals. Let's fill the special train to Galt tomorrow night and cheer our team, of which we are so proud, on to greater things.

Instead of giving you the usual halloo of air-over-worked sports writer this season, we thought perhaps local fans might be interested in a few comments taken from the Port Elgin Times regarding the game in Owen Sound. When we read the exchange papers, we often forget that perhaps hockey fans in this district might be interested in what the other fellow has to say. So here goes, and we quote:—

On the night's play, Georgetown deserved to win — they are the best senior team in Intermediate hockey, with fine players from the Bowser, Maher entries in the Toronto Mercantile.

It was largely a clean game, although in the dying moments tired bodies gave way to frayed nerves, but the final whistle found good sportsmanship at its best, with good winners and good losers congratulating each other.

Georgetown brought 100 fans and Port Elgin turned up with over 900. Few villages can compare with that record for team support away from home. The only absentees were the sick and aged, and even they would have been there if there hadn't been a shortage of cars and only one ambulance.

Georgetown's Beaumont is one sweet player. He was here, there and everywhere and as a playmaker and scorer he outshone everyone on the ice.

A rather clever item gave way to a little superstition, and we reprint — When the Lakesides stepped on the ice wearing the dejected Walkerton sweaters a chill went up and down the spinal column of this reporter. Similarity in uniforms necessitated the change. It may be superstition, but in sporting circles it has always been considered the worst of bad luck to dress a winner in the togs of a loser. Any old timer knows that bromide but still sticks to it. It's just about the same as trying to get out from behind the well-known eight-ball with a pocket shooter. It can't be done — and the Lakesides were a gone team as soon as they appeared on the ice wearing this beaten regalia. Rather than let the boys down with capital shirts it would have been far better to have them play in their underwear.

While we had no program throwers on Monday night, like in the Port Elgin game at Owen Sound, someone did drop a bottle on the ice, and we doubt if it was Egan's liniment. Time was required to clean up the broken particles. Some people never do grow up.

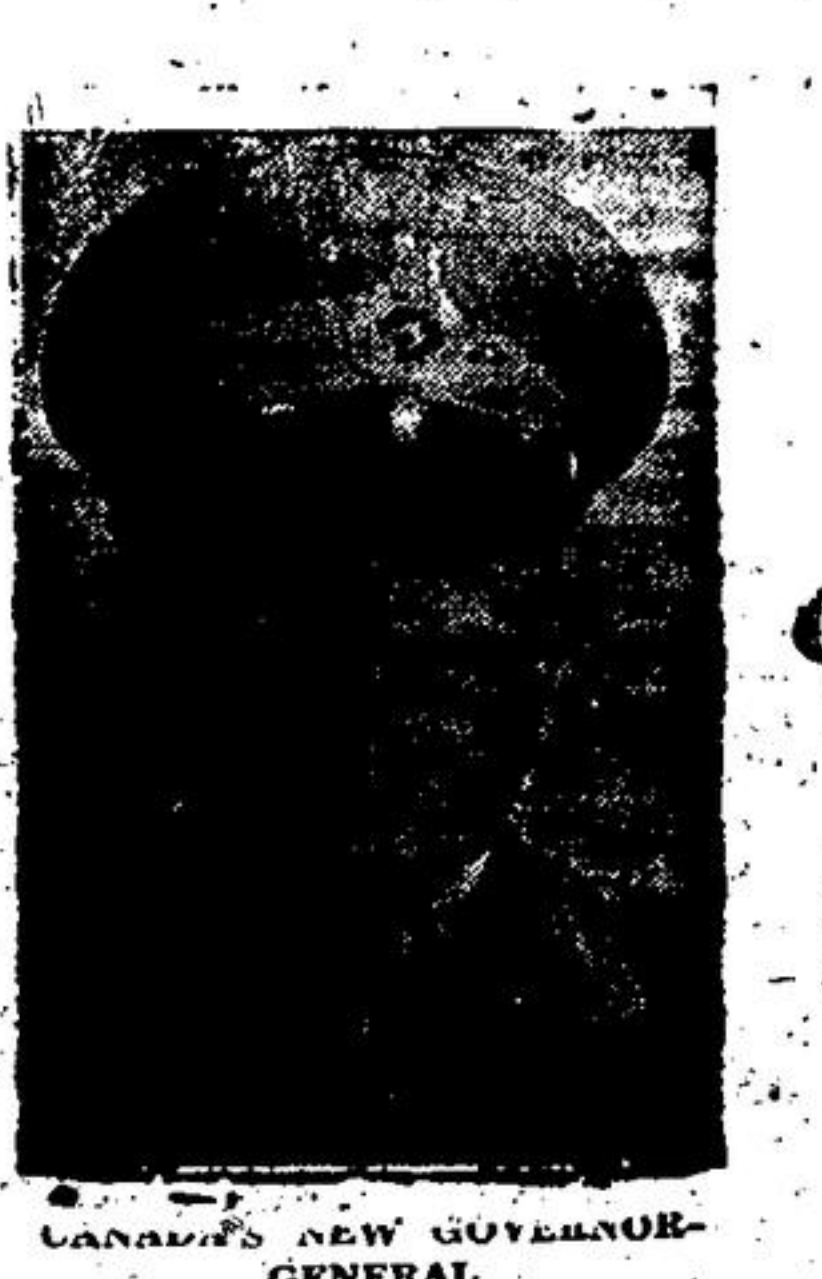
