#### Halton County Adopts. Rural Health Service

Halton County Council, in session at Militon, passed a by-law to establish a Health Unit in the County. This Health Unit will have a far wider scope than the Roral Health Service already in operation. The secretary of the County Health Committee, Reeve Kirkness, reported the findings of recent meetings, at one of which Dr. Struthers attended in an advisory capacity and the following is the estimated cost of the project and the staff required.

Medical officer of Health; \$6,000; additional medical services, \$2,000; Nursing Supervisor, \$2,200; Nurses, 6, \$10,-000; Sanitary inspectors, 2 \$4,000 Transportation, \$4,500; Nurses' Uniforms, \$525; Administration, \$4,000; Contingencies, \$1,500; Olerical, \$2,200 The cost to the County will be approximately 1 mill on the equalized assessment or 50 per cent of the total or 50c-75c per capita.

Announcement has been made that the modern plant erected a year and a half ago on King Street by Mr. Victor Diggins to house Federal Sales & Engineering, Ltd., has been sold to Maxson Food, Systems, Ltd. of Tor. The new owners will take possession this summer and according to a statement issued by Mr. Norman Vincent, president of the firm, the Georgetown branch will manufacture frozen frenchfried potatoes and other specially precooked items. It is expected that some fifty persons will be initially employ-

ed, 25 men and 25 women. Plant No. 1, which is located in th Terminal Warehouses, Toronto, wi continue to manfucature and distri bute Maxson's pre-cooked frozen meals which include meat and two regetables in a variety of menus.

There is a world-wide shortage of sugar. Last year world sugar production was twenty-five percent below 1939. Reasons for the decrease are: Destruction of the sugar industries in Java and the Philippines. Shortages of labour and fertilizers in many sugar-producing countries. Last year's drought in the Caribbean area, especially Cuba. Damage to European sugar best fields. World sugar supplies are pooled for the benefit of the United Nations. Canada, the United States and Great Britain are allotted an equal share of sugar according to population. Available supplies must also be shared with other countries. #### AMOUNT OF SUGAR USED IN CANNING

Each housewife may use her canning sugar to fit the needs of her particular household. A common method is to allow 1/4 lb. sugar for each quart sealer of canned fruit; and 11/2 lbs. sugar or each quart of jam or jelly.

SUGARLESS METHOD OF CANNING FRUIT
