FORMER ESQUEUNG BEEVE, GOODSON APPELBE DIES

A prominent citizen of Esqueung, William Goodson Appelbe, passed away at his home in Stewarttown on Monday, April 29th, after four years of poor health. Descendant of a pioneer family, he was born in Esqueung 79 years ago, the only son of the late Pierce Appelbe and Margaret Wright.

Mr. Appelbe had been prominent in township municipal life and was reeve in 1925-26, and a member of Township Council for several years before and after this. He was a member of Credit Lodge, A.F. & A.M.

Surviving are his wife, formerly Theresa Thompson, and a sister, Mrs. Margaret Corley. He also leaves a niece, Mrs. O. Tebby of Mount Forest and a nephew William Corley.

A Masonic funeral service was conducted on May 1st from the McClure Funeral Home with Rev. H. Leigh Pink officiating. Pall-bearers were D. Leslie, T. L. Leslie, W. A. Wilson, Frank Wilson, Cam Sinclair and T. Brownridge. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
