The annual meeting of the Halton County Children's Aid Society was held on Monday April 29 in St. Paul's Church, Milton.

President A. Mason of Acton, was chairman for the evening. He called upon Rev. A. W. Fosbury to open the meeting with prayer. President Mason welcomed the members of the Society to the meeting and stated that he was pleased to see such a large turnout of members and those interested in child welfare.

By motion, the Board of Directors were given power to sign the necessary documents as required by the bank.

Another motion was passed, upon recommendation of the Board of Directors, authorizing the Board to give a member of the Board authority to sign cheques, along with the Treasurer, instead of having the annual meeting make the appointment.

Miss Marjorie Dawson favored the meeting with two lovely solos which were much appreciated.

Rev. G. W. Porter, pastor of St. Paul's Church introduced the guest speaker of the evening, Mr. B. Beaumont.

Mr. Beaumont is presently Director of the Children's Division, Provincial Department of Public Welfare. He stated that he felt there never was as much interest in child welfare as now. He recommended the Superintendent's report for the member's consideration. He also stated that if we expect to have a better world, we must start with the children. Too many people do not take the responsibilities of the home seriously, due to various causes. If we are going to do the job, we must give heavily of our time, but it was worth it.

Mr. Beaumont stated that the Superintendent must have time to develop interest in the Society and new members must be brought along so that they can take their places as members of the Board of Directors. Children's Aid is not charity but is an investment in the men and women of the future and any time or money given is a good investment for the good of the country. It is an insurance that the children will have an opportunity of growing up as good citizens of the community and help them lead useful lives. You never tear down the work given to a child. It goes on and on and keeps building up over a period of years.

Mrs. Weaver moved a vote of thanks to the speaker for the splendid address also the President for the very able manner in which he conducted the meeting, also Miss Dawson and her accompanist for the solos.

The Board of Directors held a meeting and the following officers were appointed:

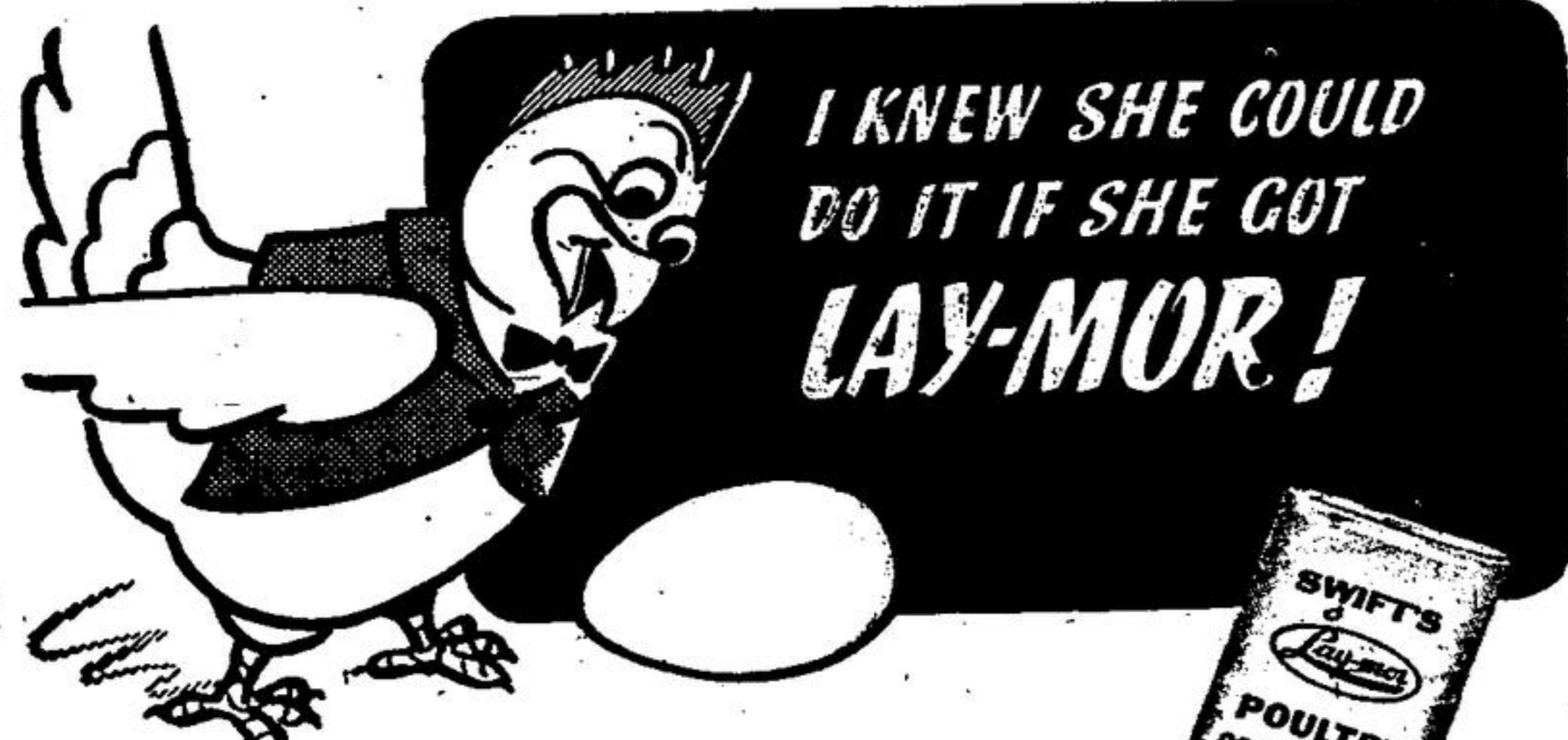
