G.H.S. Entries Outstanding in Peel Music Festival

On Saturday night, hundreds were turned away from the doors of St. Paul's Church, Brampton, when the Peel Music Festival ended in a blaze of glory with a concert given by the most outstanding winners in the two-week Festival. Particularly conspicuous were the entries from Georgetown High School, whose four choir entries made a clean sweep and brought home four silver cups. Other choirs were entered from Brampton, Orangeville and Port Credit. It was mainly the superiority of the Georgetown alto and bass sections and the blend of the choir as a whole that brought success to the locals. The lesson is interpretation given by Mr. Capps was also a great help.

In the duet and solo classes, local students won six gold, four silver and three bronze medals. The Festival was in the nature of a personal triumph for fifth-former, Marion Hepburn, who won two gold medals, including the Ladies Oratorio, where she was the youngest competitor in an open class of twelve, and a bronze medal. In addition, she conducted three of the choirs in their cup-winning efforts, where she was ably assisted by accompanist, Kenneth Harrison.

Joyce Hill, entering her first contest, took second place in a class of 22 in soprano solo, under 17. Mary Moyer was also a prominent winner, with seconds in two contralto classes and first with Miss Hepburn in vocal duet. June Clarke won the soprano solo, under 19, and placed second with Darryl Dawson in piano duet. Kenneth Harrison and Islay McClure headed the open piano duet class and Kenneth took second prize for baritone solo. William Long was first prize winner in the euphonium solo.
