**To the Citizens of Ward 3:**

WHO SUPPORTED THE RECENTLY CIRCULATED PETITION CONCERNING ENFORCEMENT OF EXISTING SPEED LAWS WITHIN THE CORPORATION. THE DELEGATES, WHO PRESENTED THE PETITION TO THE COUNCIL AT ITS MEETING MONDAY EVENING LAST, WISH TO REPORT:

At the meeting of the council your petition was presented. As a result of this the council voted to put signs at all main entrances to the town and at other necessary places.

As to the enforcement of the speed limit set by law they would give us no satisfaction beyond saying that the police force would do its best. That the police force is already doing its best, with the results you are aware of, they had already admitted. They also agreed that the police are too burdened with extra-curricular duties to carry out their police duties efficiently; yet this was the nearest thing to a definite answer that we were able to obtain.

The presence of your delegates did, however, seem to bring to a head several issues, such as that of one man being humanly unable to handle efficiently all the duties, outside of purely police routine, which are put upon him. But after two hours' bickering and in spite of the efforts of our councillors Goodlet and MacKenzie, they were unable to agree on any immediate measures to rectify the situation.

We invite your suggestions as to further steps which should be taken. In closing we would urge all voting citizens to attend at least one council meeting. They enlighten one immeasurably.
