Educational Report Submitted at County **Council Meeting**

RECOMMEND AREAS FOR BURLI-NGTON, OAKVILLE AND ONE FOR NORTHERN PART OF COUNTY

Mr. J. M. McDonald, Acton, presented the report of the Consultative Committee on Education at a special meeting of Halton County Council held in Milton, This committee was formed to inquire into the advisability of establishing larger High School Areas, in the county as recommended by the Provincial Department of Education. Also present at the meeting were oth-

er members of the committee: W. B. Shipley, Oakville; M. M. Robinson, Burlington; L. L. Skuce, P.S.I. and secretary for the committee, and also W. Stewart from the Department of Edu-

Mr. McDonald, in giving his report stated that the Committee had been guided by the following factors:

1. That every child in the county should have equal opportunity of securing education best suited to his or her requirements, irrespective of where the home is located.

2: To create school districts large enough to ensure an attendance that could allow optional subjects, in addition to academic ones to be taught ge to choose from in order to satisf personal preference of special ability 3. Accessability, including therewith distance to be travelled, road condit ions, and in the northern areas, which

4. Minimum cost to all ratepayers. The school dstricts recommended were as follows:

are more sparsely populated, central lo-

1. Oakville-Trafalgar District-High school to be located in Oakville.

2. Burlington-Nelson District-High school to be located in Burlington.

3. Northern Halton District — with a school to be located at Speyside or some other central point and to include the remainder of the County, being the towns of Milton and Georgetown. village of Acton, all of Esquesing and Nassagaweya and part of Nelson. Transportation would be arranged by a schedule of school buses which would

be free of charge to the pupils. The cost of this revised system o High School education would be approximately between 4 and 5 mills for

each district. Burlington and Oakville are strongly in favor of the move, but many of those present at the meeting were agreed that it might be quite a problem to ge the idea sold to those living in the northern end of the county, since it would probably mean the High Schools already in existence would be discontinued and a new school built at Speyside to serve the combined areas. A committee was appointed to go into the matter of forming a High School zone for North Halton and were as follows: Meesrs, K. R. MacDonald,

Georgetown; W. Murray, Esquesing; Dr. O. H. Heslop, Milton; Lloyd Crawford, Nassagawaya and Chas. Kirkhess

The clerk was asked to have a by-law prepared for the regular meeting of the County Council on Tuesday so that those wishing to take advantage of this new scheme may do so without further delay. (To become effective January 1st it is necessary that a bylaw be passed before July 1st).
