Looks like a double-barrelled opening for summer sport this week-end, with Georgetown and Milton meeting on Saturday in the first fixture of the county baseball series, and Norval starting things off in lacrosse Monday at the recreation centre there.

Georgetown's first baseball team in many years has a lot of pre-game question marks, which it is natural to expect after such a long lay-off. Coaching has been a problem to date, with Andy Ritchie volunteering as playing manager for the games, but no one as yet to take over for the equally-important practices.

Only three or four of the old uniforms have been rounded up, but we hear that a deal might be made for uniforms originally ordered for Acton Juveniles.

Pitching duties will be handled by Bill Brydon and two south-paw teammates, hockey-star Sooty Patterson and Van Zant, who hails from Kirkland Lake. Bill Ritchie is catcher, and among those who will don uniform are Gord Lane, Jack Kemshead, Wheldon Emmerson, George Chapman, Bungy Ward, Bob and Joe McMenemy, Nick Brown, Larry Ritchie and Johnny and Everett Wilson.

Norval has several big guns to shoot against Cheltenham in the Peel lacrosse opener. Joe Schertal, Nick Ferri, Jack Shropshire, Olley Burton, Andy Creighton and Olley Raine, are among the tops in what promises to be a championship team.

Also looming on the sports front is a midgeet pro-baseball league which the Recreational Council is sponsoring under the leadership of E. J. Newman and Gordon "Lefty" Alcott. At the Lions meeting Monday night, "Lefty" outlined a program which should give the kids the biggest summer of sport they've ever had. He has been in contact with Jimmy Grudis, chief scout for the Toronto Maple Leafs, who has promised to come out and bring some of his team to coach the young lads in the fine points of the game. It is hoped to arrange this for June 3rd, with the visitors being guests at the Lions meeting, where they will give some tips to the team coaches and managers.

Lefty has the idea of doing for baseball what he did for midgeet hockey in Georgetown and later in Copper Cliff. More about this next week!
