The treasurer's report was given by Mr. R. F. Sanderson of Oakville who urged the prompt payment of conference and Presbytery fees.

The Presbytery then proceeded to the election of officers for the Conference Year 1946-47. Since Rev. A. W. Fosbury had been serving as Chairman for only part of a conference year, ne was elected by acclamation as Chairman for the incoming year. Rev. N. J. Truax of Carlisle was returned to office as Secretary of Presbytery and Mr. R. F. Sanderson was elected as treasurer.

The settlement Committee representatives elected were Rev. R. F. Mercer of Appelby and the Chairman, and these, with Rev. J. B. Moore of Waterdown are to serve as the Pastoral Relations Committee of Presbytery. It was learned with sincere regret that Rev. A. O. W. Foreman of Ballinafad is to retire from the active work this year, after having served the Church as minister for some forty years.

At 1.46 Presbytery met with Presbyterial to hear a message from Dr. Gordon Agnew, West China University, Chengtu, West China. His address was of the usual highly inspirational and intellectual nature and provoked deep thought and consideration on the part of the hearers. The need of making the Christian Church more missionary in spirit is quite evident for the opportamities in the East are greater today than ever before.

The afternoon session of the Presbytery commenced with a brief worship period under the leadership of the Rev. R. F. Mercer. Reports of the various committees of Presbytery were presented, discussed and dealt with.

Rev. George Service of Zion United Church, Hamilton, spoke to the Presbytery regarding Pension Fund Capital Campaign as it applies to the Hamilton Conference. He reported that the general canvass is going well throughout the conference and church as a whole. Halton Presbytery showed that good progress was being made toward meeting its allocation. Carlisle was the first charge in the conference to report that its allocation had been accepted and underwritten, Waterdown being a close second.

The names of Rev. E. B. Eddy of Oakville and the chairman were nominated as Commissioner from Presbytery to the General Council. After two tie votes, Rev. E. B. Eddy was elected on the withdrawal of the chairman, Mr. R. P. Sanderson was elected Lay Commissioner.
