Browne, he was taken prisoner by the Germans during action in Italy on May 2, 1944, and was liberated by the advancing Allied troops shortly before V-E day. Georgetown had 10 hits for 7 runs from Blinco's offerings, while Milton made the most of 7 hits to score their 9 runs. Errors were plentiful, three for Georgetown and four for Milton. Patterson again led the Georgetown batters with three hits, Bill Ritchie collected a pair, and Andy Ritchie, Wilson, Evans, Brydon and Bob McMenemy one apiece.
