### DAVIE. FAMILY IN CONCERT AT KNOX PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH

Women's Association of Knox Presbyterian Church, Georgetown, sponsored a remarkable concert in the church Monday evening given by the Davie family of London, Ont. There was a good-sized audience. Artists were — Vera Henderson Davie, accompanist and musical director; Frances Davie, mezzo soprano; Noble Davie, baritone; Nelles Davie, basso. Program comprised twenty-seven solo and ensemble numbers — oratorio, grand opera, light opera, concert lyric, folk-song, negro spiritual and traditional ballad — representing Handel, Bach, Gluck, Rossini, Bizet, Rachmaninoff, Oscar Strauss and modern song writers.

It was a bewildering concert offering. Amongst other concerted numbers was Bach's motet — "Jesu, Joy of man's desiring" — sung as a trio. Lovelier tone painting and clearer words have never been heard by this reviewer. The singers drew inspiration from one another all the way and the audience caught the infection. It was like this with everything that was sung. Three beautiful individual voices — not a forced nor quavering tone amongst them. A mezzo-soprano melow as the thrush and limpid as the nightingale. A baritone of John Charles Thomas range and sympathy. A basso cavernous as Paul Robeson's with tenor timbre in topmost register. And the words of the singers were beautiful as their tones. The faces of the singers reflected the refinement of their song. A full two-hour concert of vocal music touchingly sincere and refreshing. Vera Henderson Davie at the piano was a miniature orchestra without orchestral distraction. It was a privilege to hear such gifted and unassuming artists.
