PUBLIC SCHOOL NEWS

Last week was the final week for the sale of War Savings Stamps at the School. The total sales for 1945-1946 were 112575. This method of saving has been carried on continuously since Jan. 1941 and the grand total of War Savings purchases was \$3300. The government has decided to discontinue this system of savings in September.

The pupils have just completed their final paper drive for the year collecting approximately 6 tons during last week. The total amount collected during the year was 17 tons. The net proceeds are to go toward the purchase of a movie projector. The fund now has a total of approximately \$100. The staff and pupils wish to thank the citizens of the town for their continued cooperation in this work.

On Tuesday of last week the pupils were organized into groups and as such assisted the town by collecting the clothing throughout the town for European Relief. In all about 60 cartons of good used clothing was shipped to headquarters in Toronto. The staff and pupils were assisted by a number of ladies who did the sorting and packing at the town hall.

The final assembly for the school year was held in the auditorium on Wednesday last. After the exercises Albert Carter, a Grade VIII pupil who represented the school at the County Council in Milton, in May, gave an account of his day there. Albert was successful in winning 7th prize for his essay on "My Visit to Halton County Council" out of an entry list of over 50. Following this the eight boys who had charge of the Safety Patrol at the school during the past year, were congratulated both by the Principal and by Harold McClure for their splendid work. Mr. McClure then presented the Lions Club scholarship awards to the two girls and the two boys of Grade VIII who stood highest in the contest for general proficiency. They were Jean Lattimer, Joan Tuck, Hazel Tapp, and Donald Burns.

During the spring term the school pupils have enjoyed a considerable amount of softball. Since April 15th there have been from 7 to 9 softball diamonds in operation almost every day. The boys enjoyed games in a small "House League." The senior girls played two games with Grade IX of the High School, winning one and losing one. The Senior Boys played two games with Grade IX of the High School winning both by "comfortable" margins. They also played two with Milton Public School winning one and losing one.

The June promotion list for the various grades in the school will appear in next week's paper.
