COUNTRY HOMES URGENTLY NEEDED

An urgent appeal is being made by the Protestant Children's Homes at 28 Selby Street, Toronto, for foster homes for boys from eight to fifteen years. Homes are required for boys for a period of a few months and in some cases a few years. The foster parents are paid \$20 a month plus Family Allowance. Clothing, medical, dental care and pocket money are supplied by the agency. The boys come from homes where because of illness or destruction there is no one to care for them. Anyone who can provide a home for the boys is asked to get in touch with Protestant Children's Homes at 28 Selby Street, RA. 5121. Homes are accepted within the radius of 35 miles of Toronto.
