## G.R.C. Plans Big Track and Field Meet

Early last spring the Georgetown Recreational Council reserved the Park for the Civic Holiday, Monday, August 5th. One look at the programme reminds one of the British Empire Games held at Hamilton some years before the war. There are events for every taste — every age — and every event will be a thriller for the spectators.
