Caution Care in Use

Of Garden Fertilizer

Great care should be taken in the use of commercial fertilizers in small gardens, because there is often a tendency to use too much and the theory if one pound is good, two pounds would be better. This is not the case, however, and not more than 50 to 60 pounds of commercial fertilizer should be used on a plot 30 by 50 in size. Nitrate of soda and sulfate of ammonia are frequently used as a side dressing for growing crops which are grown for their leaves and stems rather than for their fruit. Apply it a short distance from the plants where the small feeder roots may reach it, but do not get it on the leaves of the plant. Not more than one pound per 100 feet of row should be used and it should be worked into the soil immediately after it is spread. It should be remembered no living thing will grow unless it is fed, and gardeners will find that it will pay to feed their crops. Fertilizers are the food. But just as in other living organisms, too much food is as bad as not enough food, whether it is manure, compost or commercial fertilizers.

The most important factor in preparing the proper foundation for the garden is to see to it that the ground is well crumbled and fine of texture, and that it contains sufficient organic matter in the way of manure, compost or other material to keep it spongy and "alive" and to prevent it from packing and becoming hard and unworkable.

Farm Market Grows

For Chemical Products

The farm market for chemicals, always large, is rapidly increasing in size and diversity. As a result, several new laboratories for agricultural research have recently been announced by both chemical and petroleum companies. A new group of complete organic chemicals which control plant development in various ways has become available in the last decade. Naphthalene acetic acid, sprayed on apple trees, causes the apples to remain until a more convenient picking time; cyanamid dusted on cotton plants causes the leaves to fall in time for convenient mechanical harvesting. One group of chemicals hastens sprouting of seed potatoes and other tubers without the usual dormant period and another prevents sprouting of potatoes when stored for food. Seeds may be treated with any of a number of materials to increase productivity. Seedless vegetables may be produced by application of plant hormones to unfertilized blooms and the alkaloids colchicine and sanguinarine have been found to hasten the evolutionary process, thus speeding development of improved strains. Other chemicals, when absorbed, are said to render a plant undesirable to insects.

Cabbage Vitamins

Cabbage is a vitamin-rich vegetable, according to the U. S. department of agriculture, but the best leaves rarely reach the table, or even the store or kitchen. The six wrapper leaves—the flaring outside ones that are commonly stripped from the heads before marketing—have been found to produce the greatest quantity of the three principal vitamins found in cabbage, vitamin C and vitamins B-1 and B-2. The vegetable contains, approximately a thousand times as much vitamin C as it does of the other two. It is pointed out that cabbage as a vitamin source has often suffered in comparison with such leafy vegetables of its own family as kale and turnips, but the wrapper leaves which correspond to the large leaves of turnips and kale, produce just as much of all three vitamins as the more common greens, or even more.

Water System

If you're thinking about installing that long desired water system on your farm, it will pay you to look ahead and complete your plans. Farmers who can install a skeleton system this year should plan for future expansion. The skeleton should be made to serve the basis for a complete water system later on. In general, if you want to make the most of your water installation, remember three things: First, choose a pressure system with enough capacity to serve the whole farm. Second, be sure to put in pipe large enough to serve the plumbing equipment you intend to install. Finally, just to avoid mistakes and to make sure you won't have to remove and replace plumbing later on, think out all of the details in advance. Figure out where you want every pipe, hydrant and faucet.

Make Shoes Last

Want to stretch the mileage you get from those shoes? Keep shoes clean and save leather. Sometimes soap and water does the trick—lots of soap but just as little water as possible. Use saddle, castile or a mild soap. Dip the brush or wring cloth in tepid water, rub on soap to produce rich lather and go to work. Don't rinse. Instead, wipe off lather with a soft clean cloth. Wait until leather is dry, then go ahead with your regular cleaner or polish. Despoiling cloth shoes is comparatively simple. Just flick out with garment dry cleaner. Oil and grease spots on leather are harder, often impossible to remove. Have it done, once, professionally.

JERSEYS SET R.O.P.

RECORD IN JUNE

Two hundred and sixty Jersey cows qualified in the R.O.P. for the month of June, which is the largest number in the history of the Jersey Breed in Canada.

The high record was made by the outstanding cow Brampton Lady Basilia, that has led her class many times before. This time Basilia produced at 9 years of age on three times milking in 365 days 14,971 lbs. of milk, 836 lbs. of fat, qualifying for a medal of merit certificate. Lady Basilia bred and owned by B. H. Bull & Son at Brampton, is a daughter of World's Record cow Brampton Basilia. Lady's total production to date is 98,224 lbs. of milk, 6,353 lbs. of fat. This production was made in 7 records, and gives her an average of 90 lbs. of fat for each record.

The leader in the three year olds on 3 times milking is one of the famous Molly sisters, Brampton Molly Basilia—125113—that produced 15,026 lbs. of milk, 854 lbs. of fat. Molly is a daughter of Brampton Basilia Superior, Gold and Silver Medal sire. Molly is classified Excellent, and her dam is classified Excellent, and her full sister as well, owned by B. H. Bull & Son, Brampton.

On the four year olds on two times milking, the leader is Grove Farm Noble Fairy—117897—This cow was bred by Col. Harry Cockshut, Brantford, Ontario and owned and tested by Lorne G. Ellis, Rockwood, Ontario. Fairy produced 12,577 lbs. of milk, 644 lbs. of fat, qualifying for a Gold and Silver Medal certificate. She is a daughter of the imported bull Brampton Wonder Aim, now at the head of the herd of George H. Innes, Woodstock, Ontario.

On three times milking the leader is Brampton Vigil Pinn—126114—a cow bred by B. H. Bull & Son, Brampton, Ontario and owned and tested by Bellavista Farms, Ltd., Milner, B. C. Pinn produced 8,706 lbs. of milk, containing 479 lbs. of fat. She is a daughter of the superior sire Pinnacle. On two times milking the leader is Queensway Rose Lightfoot—142462—bred and owned by T. A. Gowland & Sons, Brampton, Ontario. Lightfoot produced 8,309 lbs. of milk, containing 472 lbs. of fat. She is a daughter of the imported bull Brampton Lightfoot Oxford.

A real treat in store for September—Georgetown's Department Fall Fair. Keep to be in the old home town.
