The Jersey cow Grove Farm Noble Fairy—117857 — bred by the late Col. Harry Cockshutt, Brantford, Ontario and owned and tested by Lorne G. Ella, Rockwood, Ontario, has been awarded a Gold and Silver Medal certificate by the Canadian Jersey Cattle Club. Fairy went on test as a Senior four year old, and in 305 days produced 12,527 lbs. of milk, 644 lbs. of fat, with an average test of 5.14%. Fairy is a daughter of Brampton Wonder Aim, an imported bull now at the head of the herd of George H. Innes, President, of the Canadian Jersey Club, Woodstock, Ontario.

TWO LOCAL FEED MILLS COMBINE UNDER ONE MANAGEMENT

With the announcement that Mrs. Hedley Shaw has sold her feed business on Mill Street to the Georgetown Feed Mill, the town has now only one mill as it had five years ago. The Hedley Shaw business was established by the late Mr. Shaw about five years ago, when he came to Georgetown from Toronto and bought the business from Calvin Clark. At that time, it was located in the present Georgetown Feed Mill premises on the highway. Mr. Clark later took possession of the building again and started up the Georgetown Feed Mill, which he sold a few years ago to Mr. William Brydon, who in turn sold it to the Upshall Brothers of Brampton in January of this year.

The Shaw business was meanwhile moved to the present location on Mill Street in the building recently purchased by Tom Hewson for his real estate, implement and automobile agency. Mrs. Shaw has carried on the business since her husband was killed in action with the army overseas. Clare Wilson who has been employed with Mrs. Shaw has accepted a position with the new management. The business will be operated by Russell Upshall in partnership with his brother-in-law, Delmer Maltby.

Mrs. Shaw and the children, Sandra, Sydney and Beverley, will be moving to Toronto to make her home.

MRS. J. N. McPHERSON DIES IN BRANTFORD

A life-long Norval resident, Mrs. John Noble McPherson passed away suddenly in Brantford General Hospital on Friday, July 19th. Mrs. McPherson had been recuperating from an illness which confined her to a nursing home in Paris during the past six months and had been able to visit Norval a few weeks ago.
