BORDEN AWARD GIVEN

PROF. FRED HUTT
For contributions in the field of poultry genetics and breeding, Dr. Fred E. Hutt, professor of animal genetics at Cornell University has received the 1946 Borden award of \$1000 cash and a gold medal. The presentation was made at a dinner of the International Baby Chick Association, held in the Jefferson Hotel in St. Louis.

Dr. Hutt, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H. L. Hutt of Georgetown, has owned and managed poultry since the age of 12, paying all his college expenses by raising poultry on his father's farm. He obtained his Bachelor of Science degree from the University of Toronto in 1923, and advanced degrees from the University of Wisconsin, Manitoba and Edinburgh.
After teaching at the University of Minnesota, he was appointed professor of animal genetics and poultry husbandry at Cornell University at Ithaca, N.Y. In connection with his work, he has visited many experimental stations in the United States and Canada, as well as agricultural colleges, universities and research institutes in England, Scotland, Sweden, Denmark and Germany.

CONTRACT LET FOR 23 VETERAN'S HOUSES, SHORTAGES MAY DELAY BUILDING

At a special meeting of Georgetown Council on Monday evening, a deal was closed with Mr. E. B. Tyers, now owner of Godarvale Farm, for the purchase by the town of a block of his farm which was necessary for the building project for 50 veterans homes. Decision to purchase the property was made at an earlier Council meeting when it was found that the land already owned by the town would not accommodate a sufficient number of homes. The property brought from Mr. Tyers is approximately 3 1/2 acres and the price paid was \$1000.
Council has been advised that the contract has been let for 23 houses, but chances of completing any or all of these this year seem to be slimming. Shortages of every type of building material, aggravated by the many strikes throughout Canada makes even the Wartime Housing priorities of no avail.

Esquing Native, Pioneer Family Member, John R. Scott Dies

A well-known resident of the Limehouse district and resident of Georgetown for the past four months, John Robert Scott passed away in Toronto General Hospital on Sunday, August 18, following an operation. Mr. Scott had been ill for the past two months.

He was the son of the late William Scott and Rachel Arthur, and was born 59 years ago on the family farm at lot 25/2 concession 6, on which he lived until his retirement. The Scott homestead was in the family over 100 years until sold to Mr. R. Mulder last fall.

Mr. Scott was a faithful member of the Presbyterian Church being a member of Limehouse Church all his life, where he had served as an elder for many years. In 1904, he was married at the Manse in Georgetown by Rev. Cameron to Elizabeth Hall.

Mr. Scott is survived by his wife and five children, Mrs. William Shelbourne (Birdie), Limehouse; Mrs. Wm. Norrie (Hazel), Toronto; Arthur, Georgetown; Mrs. Sid Mills (Irene), Terra Cotta; and Harold, Glen Williams. He was predeceased by one son, Wilfred, who died in infancy.
