**CAMPBELLFORD SHOE PLANT BECOMES DAYFOOT SUBSIDIARY**

A recent business deal of interest in the shoe industry is the purchase of Gravelin-Bale, Limited at Campbellford, Ontario by Mr. E. C. Johnston of Georgetown. Mr. Johnston is owner of the Dayfoot Shoe Company here, which he purchased last year from Mr. C. B. Dayfoot.

The Gravelin-Bale line of work shoes which is a cheaper grade than the high quality Dayfoot line, will complement the Georgetown product and make it possible for one selling organization to carry a more complete range of work shoes for the trade. The Campbellford firm was established in 1934, and the former owners, Messrs. Gravelin and Bale are retiring from business after many years spent in the shoe business. The purchase of the company is one link in post-war expansion plans of the Dayfoot Shoe Company for increased domestic and export business.

Mr. Vern Callow, who was for several years a resident of Brampton, and worked with Mr. Johnston in Georgetown for a time, is plant superintendent at Gravelin-Bale. Well-known throughout the industry, Mr. Callow was with the Dominion Shoe Inspection Board during the war.
