# Esquesing Agricultural Society 1846-1946

ELEBRATING, as we are this year, the one hundredth anniver sary of the founding of the Esquesing Agricultural Society, interesting to delve back into the history of the intervening year and note the progress that has been made along the way. One. dred years is surely a long time for one institution to be in exis and had its activities not been progressive in the agricultural we doubt if it could have weathered the many lean years it have experienced in the beginning and through numerous depre and war years.

When one realizes that the Esquesing Fair is the first in We tern Ontario to erect a centenary pylon and flagpole (given by the Ontario Department of Agriculture for one hundred years contributed tion in the agricultural field), and that only five have been erected in Eastern Ontario to date, it can readily be seen that the Esqua Society was one of the first to take up the torch for the advance the pioneer farmer. Fairs in Eastern Ontario which have passed the century mark include Delta, organized in 1830; Port Hope, 1881 Ernesttown, 1835; Carleton Co., 1844; and Vankleck Hill, 1844.

#### A PIONEER BEGINNING

Picture, if you can, the pioneer farmers of the last century whe decided to organize for the first fair and agricultural Society. Much of this country was still in a very primitive state—the log cabin was still in evidence, especially farther to the west. There was not great deal of clearance,, although the more up-to-date and wealthier farmer had progressed considerably by this time. Motor cars were unheard of, and oxen teams were still in use on the farm. We can picture some of the pioneers came to that first organization meeting by oxen cart.

#### OLD JOURNAL REPORTS

it is almost impossible to get a true glimpse of proceedings at the first organization meeting. Old-timers say it was held in the old township hall at Stewarttown, and at that time this was a thriving community with a large number of inhabitants, taverns, stores and industry. Government records do not reach back far enough from which we may obtain information, but a paragraph from "Journal and transactions of the Board of Agriculture, of Upper Canada, Vol. 1, Toronto, 1856 extract from county report, p.527, says: The Town ships of Nelson, Trafalgar, and Esquesing, have each Societies established therein for some length of time, and from the exhibitions held during the summer in these fine townships, we can truly say that their agriculture is at present in an advanced state'.'

As late as 1858, pounds, shillings and pence were still in evil dence, and a further paragraph from the Journal reads as follows: P.71-"One hundred and one members; amount of subscriptions, 236 Government grant, £24; total receipts, including balance from previous year, £75, 15s., 6d; total disbursements in premiums and general expenses £62, 15s., 0%'d.; balance in treasurer's hands £13, 0s., 5%d.

P. 240-"Esquesing, one hundred and thirty-six members? Amount of subscriptions £36, 10s.; balance from 1855, £13, 13s., 11146. share of public grant, £29, 5s.; total receipts £84, 8s., 11 %d. Amount paid in premiums £52, 17s., 6d.; incidental expenses £14, 1s., 4%d.; balance in hand £17, 10s., 1d." While the first fair was held in 1846, it was not until between 1864-68 that the Society asked that a charter be filed.

### THE FIRST FAIR

It must have been an exciting day for those pioneer farmers, as they brought their produce and livestock to Stewarttown for exhibition. We understand the hall at Stewarttown was used for displaying the vegetables, grain and ladies' work, while the fair proper took place in Murray's field, behind the present schoolhouse on the top of the hill. There were probably lines of hooked rugs, mitts and socks as the women-folk vied for the honors, as well as those delicated ous loaves of homemade bread, buns and sausages that are inclined to be conspicuous by their absence at present day shows.

While records are meagre to substantiate our claims, we believe that one, Abraham Scott, was the first president of the Society. Col. John Murray, grandfather of J. C. Murray, still a resident of Stewarttown, was the first secretary-treasurer. Not many have held this position in the one hundred years-L. Grant, J. A. Tracy and Wm. A. Wilson held the secretaryship for quite a number of years. while only recently Oscar Lerch, Frank Petch and Garfield L. Mor Gilvray, the present secretary, have had terms of short duration.

About 1875 the fair was moved from Stewarttown to George town, and was held in the Market Square, which was then vacant land, bordered by Market, Church, Edith and Factory Streets. Then as now, it was only a one day fair and the square was boarded in by an eight foot fence along these streets for the fair. The old drill hall that stood below the library was used for display purposes. The first show on the present grounds in the Georgetown park took place in 1889. Around this time the fair, being a township fair, was held alternate years in Acton and Georgetown, and it was not until 1906 that the last fair was held in Acton. It was in 1907 that W. A. Wilson now a life member of the Esquesing Agricultural Society, became president; Joe Flynn of Acton was president in 1908, and John Cunning ham in the year 1909. In 1907 the Society organized a plowing match that drew much attention, and this was held in William Cleave's field:

Interviewing W. A. Wilson, probably the one man living who knows more about the Society than anyone else, he informs us that he can remember his father showing an imported Preston bay mare at Esquesing fair back in 1879. W. J. Alexander, another of the older members and now vice-president of the Society, has also a good memory, and can recall many of the exhibitors—back in the 80% and early '90's-Brain Bros. showed oxen; imported Shorthorns wer exhibited by Thomas Boak; Leicester sheep were shown also by Brain Bros., while Henry Ross was the first exhibitor of Holstein cattle John Brownridge was an outstanding exhibitor of Yorkshire, Tamworth and Berkshire pigs, and his early breeding of registered swind has been carried on down through the years by his descendants, who to this day breed and export high quality hogs. Other large breeders of pigs were Jim and Tom McKenzie.

Road and carriage horses were the pride of the early fairs they are today. Around 1900 and previous some of the exhibitor were John Wrigglesworth, Wm. Patterson, Jos. Brownridge, Wm Fisher, Wm. Leslie, Sandy Waldie, Jos. Cottrell, W. Wilson, Henry Wilson, J. D. Orr, Neil Gillies, J. L. Clark, John McDonald, Davi Brooks, Harrison Bros., Mark Given, D. L. Herbert, Allan Devereaux Hugh Morrison, Andy Little, Aiken Dolson, Ashenhurst Bros., Fulle Bros., R. J. Graham, John McKay, Goodson Appelbe, James Nickel and Sons, Dr. H. A. Reid. W. J. Alexander was one of the early exhibitors of exhibition poultry, as were W. Nelson and Son and Gor don Graham. C. E. Herrington, another noted fancier, started shows ing at Georgetown fair about the year 1908.

## PRESIDENTS THROUGH THE YEARS

Many presidents have captained the ship through its one hundred years, but it goes on record that the two most popular were the late Benjamin Petch and the present holder of the office, Craig Reid Ben Petch, as he was widely known, held office for four years, while Mr. Reid is this year serving his fourth term. Probably the most successful fairs ever held were in the time of the late Ben Petch when the Society at one time had a surplus of \$1100.00r Other prosidents were: J. B. Bessey, George Tolton, Joe Flynn, John Cunnin ham, W. A. Wilson, Thos. Moffatt, Al. Claridge, Herb Cook, Alex Jos Jim Reid, J. A. Elliott, George Leslie, Henry Wilson, Ed. Huffm Thos. Cook, T. L. Leslie, Ed. McWhirter, T. J. Brownridge, James Fisher, Hume Currie, W. C. Anthony, Herb. Cleave, Frank Petch.

In writing a condensed history of the Society we would be remiss if we did not mention the untiring services the present tree surer, P. W. Cleave, has given to the Society. For twenty-five years he has given freely of his time and talent so that "the show might go on," and has marked the progress of the Society with the prid of a job well done. This is an enviable record of service to one community.

## IN SUMMING UP

You ask why the Esquesing Agricultural Society has succeeds so well. It is due to the hard work which succeeding directorate have put into each fair—always striving to make the next one a little better than the previous one.
