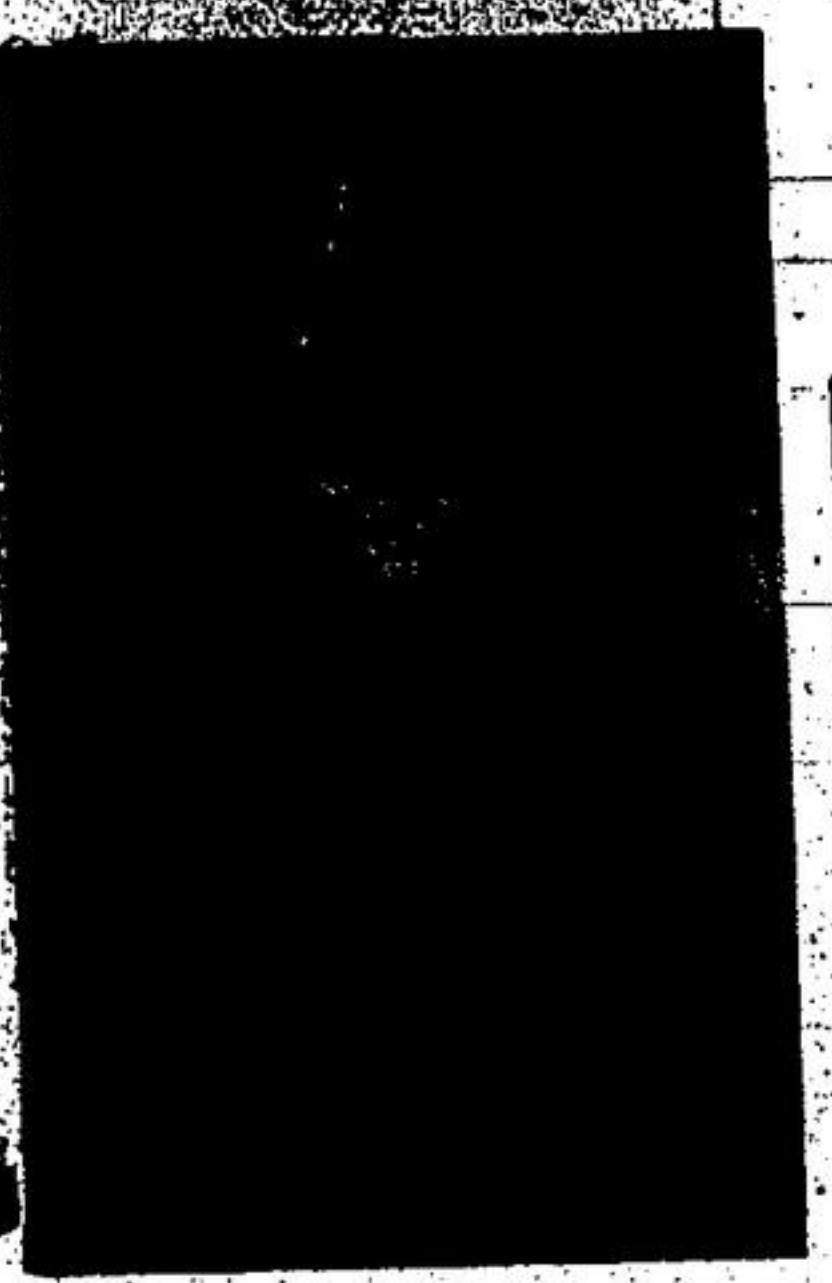

Esqueusing Council Makes Grants to Fall Fairs, Service Committees

Grants of \$100 each to Acton and Esqueusing Agricultural Societies, and \$50 to Halton Agricultural Society, as well as \$26 to the Norval Juniors Grain Club, were made by Esqueusing Council at their regular meeting on Tuesday, September 3rd. Donations were also made of \$20 to Ward 4 Service Personnel Committee and \$80 to Hornby Ward.

Sheep claims of K. O. Lindsay for \$11 and \$4 to A. N. Stark, valuator were ordered paid, and an amendment to By-Law 8 provided a payment of \$26 monthly car allowance. Relief accounts amounted to \$15.82 and road accounts to \$2806.78. By-law No. 10, 1946 was rescinded.

At a special meeting in August, Arthur Benton of Limehouse was appointed township assessor under the new system, duties to commence at the pleasure of the County Assessor, and a by-law was passed to this effect. Mr. Benton's salary will be \$1600 with \$500 yearly car allowance. He was also appointed assessor for 1947 at a salary of \$350.

Another by-law authorized the township to enter into an agreement with the Hydro for street lighting in Norval. By-law 16 authorized the assessment of the several school sections, union school sections and school area IA for 1946.

The treasurer was authorized to pay the Imperial Bank of Canada, Toron-

to, 29 George Brantley, \$1670.88 on account of gravel contract and \$100 bulldozer rental, and a number of small accounts were passed for payment.
