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LIMEHOUSE

Mr. Frank Thompson, sup't. of Halton Children's Aid Society was guest speaker at Limehouse Women's Institute meeting at Mrs. E. Miller's on Thursday last. After being introduced by social welfare convener, Mrs. A. Benton, he stated that he was at home before a group of Women's Institute members as he felt they were helpers in his work. He briefly outlined the founding of the Ontario Children's Aid Society and the history of our own organization.

He went on to tell of his work in the county investigating cases where children were neglected or abused by parents or guardians, some of which were pitiful indeed; he explained the adoption Act, stating that all cases are fully investigated and prospective foster parents are given two years care of a child before final adoption papers are signed; and the work involved in placing and caring for children of unmarried parents. During his talk he remarked that more couples wished to adopt small children than were now available, that older children were less desirable. As sometimes little or no preparation has been made for new arrivals he asked the Limehouse W. I. to prepare a layette that they would be willing to place at the disposal of the Halton Children's Aid Society.

Mrs. Ellerby, president of the W. I. thanked the speaker for his enlightening remarks and promised that the branch would give the Children's Aid Society whatever help they found possible. The answer to the roll call was the handing in of children's clothing and the good sized bundle was given Mr. Thompson to use where he found it was needed. The roll call in October will be an article for a layette.

Those taking part in the program included current events by Mrs. K. Mulder, items of interest by conveners of standing committees, the motto "And a little child shall lead them," by Mrs. Jamieson and piano selections by Neil Benton.

The President gave a full report of finances resulting from the anniversary tea, garden party and presentation to our returned men and women. The secretary stated that the conference "Developing Community Enterprise" was to be held in Milton, Sep. 20 at 2 p.m. Mrs. Hayes in charge.

Owing to the amount of materials from the Salvation Army now on hand it was decided to hold a sewing meeting, Sept. 11 at 7.30 in the Hall. Mrs. Miller served refreshments to the seventeen attending, following the National Anthem.
