WITH ROD AND REEL

This week we devote the column to an outline of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, the parent group which coordinates activities of associations such as we have started in Georgetown. The Federation came into being in 1941, being the union of two previous groups known as the Ontario Hunters' Game and Fish Protective Association and the Ontario Federation of Anglers.

The Federation stands for the perpetuation of Nature's gifts; the advocacy of measures towards well-preserved and well-managed wild-life resources; the promotion of scientific research as related to our fish, game, trees, soil, water, etc.; and the fullest co-operation with all societies and individuals in the same field of endeavour.

Membership is of two types — organization and individual. For group membership, the fee is 10c a member, fee not to exceed \$25, and individual membership is \$1 yearly. The Federation works closely with the Ontario Dept. of Game and Fisheries, and has its sanction. Every two months a news bulletin is issued, keeping members posted on current affairs pertaining to game, fish, open seasons, conservation, etc.
