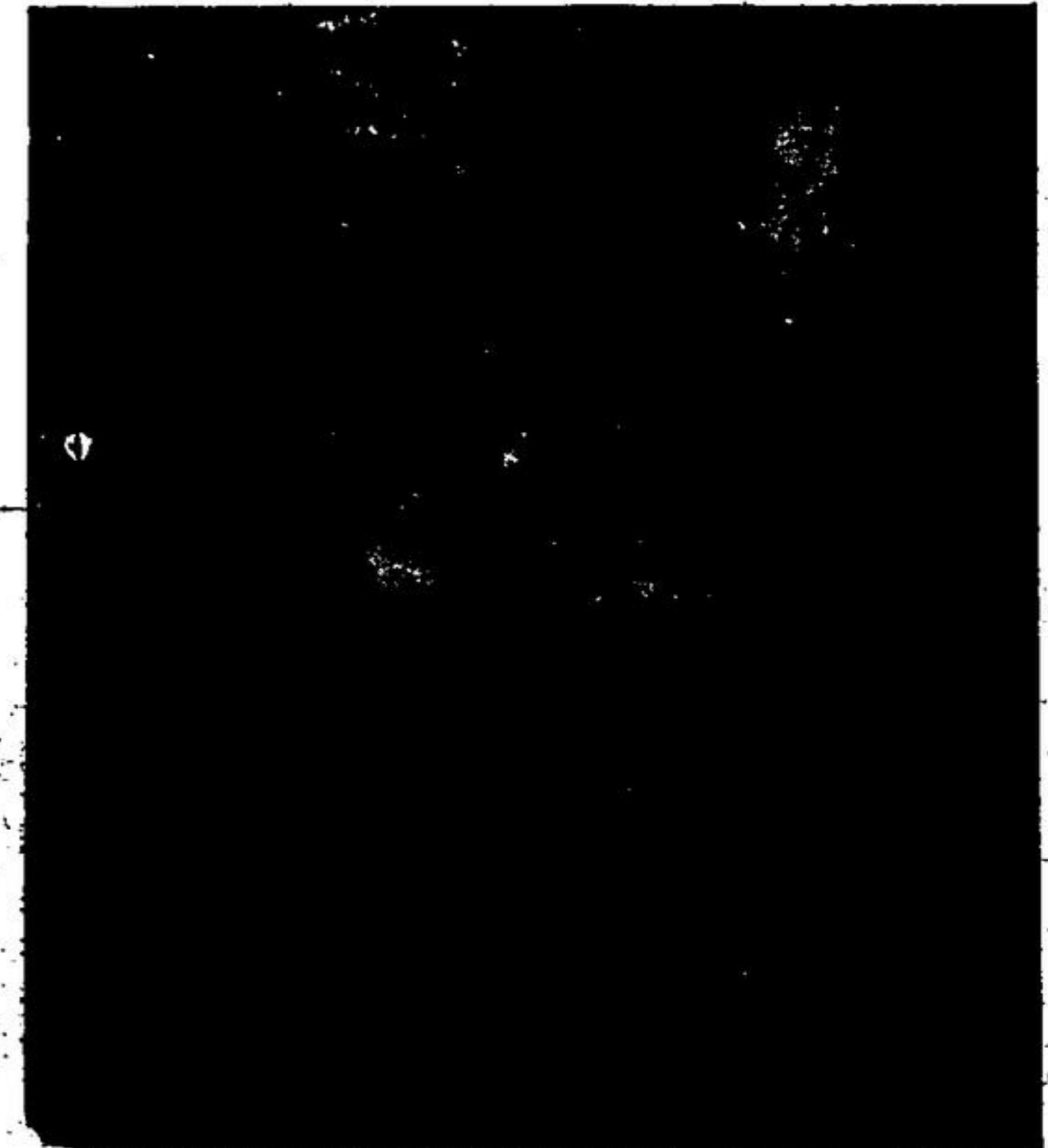
**TAG DAY — SATURDAY**
