F. J. LYLE, O.B.A.

The Honourable Dana Porter recently announced the appointment of Mr. F. J. Lyle as Director of the Trade and Industry Branch of the Department of Planning and Development.
 Mr. Lyle was born in Brantford in 1897 and received his primary and secondary education there. He was overseas in the First World War in the Infantry. He received his B.A. Sc. at the University of Toronto in 1923. He then became Superintendent of Beardmore and Company, at Acton, Ontario. From 1941 to 1945 he was with the Royal Canadian Electrical Mechanical Engineers where he served in Canada, England, France, Belgium and Holland, and was finally appointed Commander Royal Canadian Electrical Mechanical Engineers, First Canadian Army troops. He held the position before and throughout invasion of north-west Europe.

In 1945 he was appointed Trade and Industrial Commissioner at Ontario House London, where he remained until his transfer to this Department.

The business of the Trade and Industry Branch of the Department of Planning and Development has greatly increased. During the past two years a vast quantity of information has been gathered as to the industrial potentialities of the various centres of the Province. This information is now here for industrialists seeking to do business in Ontario. Information also comes in from the United States and through Ontario House from Great Britain and European countries, which is circulated quickly to organizations that may be interested. Many transactions have developed from information distributed in this way.

The Branch is now in a position to render service to manufacturers and traders in facilitating and developing export and import business. It will continue to foster and assist the establishment of industries. It maintains contact with all organizations engaged in allied work such as the Department of Trade and Commerce, the Chartered Banks, industrial commissions, Boards of Trade, Chambers of Commerce, the Manufacturers Association, the Importers and Exporters Associations. It maintains and develops contacts outside the country. It gathers comprehensive industrial statistics to provide service to businessmen and to guide the government in any policies that may affect industry.
