Many Uses Found for

Leftovers in Bread Box

Stale slices, dry crusts and other leftovers in the breadbox can make scores of delicious dishes yet often go into the garbage pail. Instead, studies of food wastes in many cities show that bread is the most wasted food in American kitchens.

Home economists suggest that sliced bread that has become too hard for the table can be used to make one of several different toasts. Melba toast, served instead of soft bread at many smart restaurants and hotels, is made simply by heating thin slices of bread in a slow oven until they are thoroughly dry and take on extra flavor. For cinnamon toast, a breakfast favorite, toast slices of bread, butter lightly and sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. French toast and cheese toast are hearty enough for main dishes. For french toast drop the bread slices in an egg and milk mixture, then brown on both sides in a little fat in the frying pan. For cheese toast, lay slices of sharp cheese, salted and peppered, between slices of un buttered bread. Brown the sandwiches on both sides in fat in a heavy frying pan, cooking rather slowly until the cheese melts.

Crusts and other odds and ends of bread can make up the supply of dry crumbs that every good cook likes to have on hand. Dry the bread in a slow oven, then roll it to crumbs, or run it through a meat grinder, medium coarse. To keep crumbs from flying, tie a paper bag on the grinder to catch crumbs as they come out. Keep crumbs covered in a jar and protected against dust and moisture. Keep them in refrigerator or a cold place.

Reports Experiments With Most Powerful Vitamin

New experiments with biotin, nature's most powerful vitamin, indicating that a drug may be developed which will inhibit the growth of several kinds of bacteria, were reported by Prof. Vincent du Vigneaud of Cornell university medical college.

Biotin, a B vitamin, is essential to life and has enormous growth-promoting powers. But some of its derivatives inhibit the growth of some types of pneumonia bacteria, streptococci, staphylococci, and intestinal bacteria. Professor du Vigneaud said.

Biotin is abundant in the yolk of eggs. Egg white, however, contains a protein, avidin, which counteracts biotin. Professor du Vigneaud reported striking evidence that the urea ring of the biotin molecule is vital for this effect of avidin on biotin. The research further showed, he said, that certain microorganisms have remarkable ability to form biotin from particular compounds. Such organisms include diphtheria bacteria and certain yeast cells.

Refinish Floor

Floors that are in good condition can be refinished to give soft, dull effects that reveal the grain of the wood. Whether your floors are comparatively new or very old, if they are finished with a paint or shellac or have some other treatment you don't like, this old finish can be removed and another put on. Some experimenting will be required first and all finishes that have been used on the floor will have to be taken off. By cleaning an inconspicuous place with a hand scraper until you come to clean wood, you can determine how deeply other finishes have penetrated. If an oil treatment has been used, and if it hasn't penetrated too deeply, a sanding machine will remove the old finishes. However, it should be operated by an experienced person in order not to cut too deeply into the wood. About one-sixteenth inch can be sanded down without injuring the floor.

Plant in Flats

Instead of planting directly in the hotbed, some gardeners prefer to plant in boxes, commonly called flats, which are later moved to the field when it is time to transplant. Thinning of the seedlings is done as soon as they develop the first true leaves. The general practice is to sow seeds rather thickly in small flats and then prick out the seedlings into other flats or directly into the hotbed soil, allowing the space they will need until transplanted to the garden. Most vegetables need about a 2 by 2 inch spacing to develop good stocky plants. However, if good sized tomato plants are desired they should be spaced 4 by 4 inches. In fact, tomatoes will stand the shock of transplanting better if they are grown in 3 or 4 inch pots.

Cleaning Range

Ordinarily, the only equipment you need for cleaning the range is a cloth and a pan of warm soapy water. For stubborn spots, you may need a finely powdered cleaner. Whiting is good for this. If you can't get spots off the oven racks or the broiler, try rubbing it lightly with a fine steel wool—grade double zero. Wash the stove clean with a cloth wrung out of warm, soapy water. And just a note of caution if yours is an electric range. Don't get soap on the electric coils when you're washing your stove. It's bad for the coils. After you've washed the stove with warm soapy water, go over it again with a cloth wrung from clean, warm water. This will rinse off the soap. Then wipe all parts dry.
