—Passed a by-law for a debenture issue up to \$5000 to cover the cost of resurfacing Queen Street.

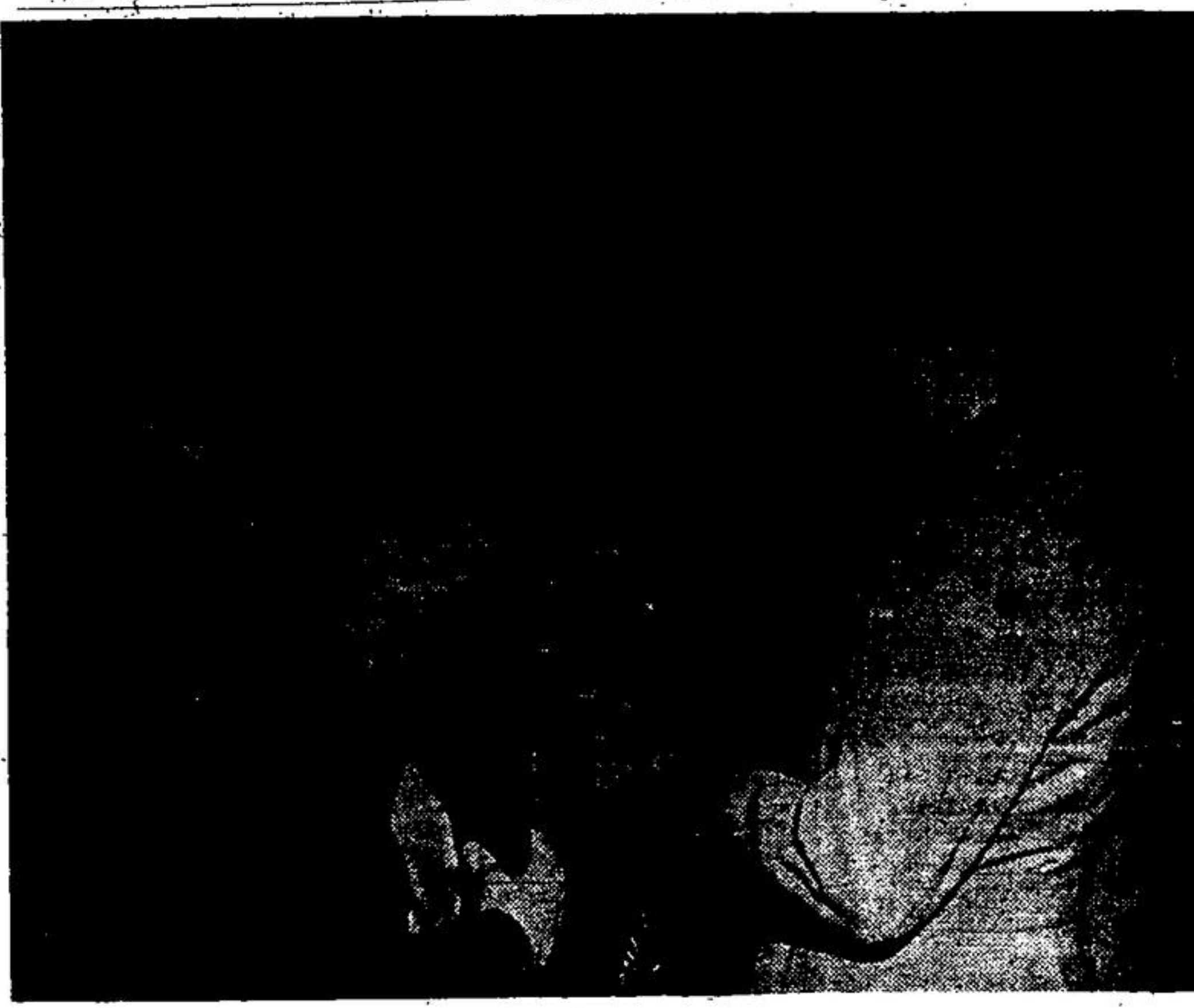
—Passed payment of \$1918 for the extensive sidewalk repairs in Georgetown this year.

Well-known locally, Major Early is an overseas veteran of this war, serving with the Princess Pats, and 1st vice-president of Branch 120, Canadian Legion. He is prominent in County Progressive-Conservative groups and was nominated in favour of Mr. W. A. Nicholson of Burlington, who unsuccessfully contended the seat.

Mr. Early takes office on November 1st at a salary of \$1800 yearly and will start on the new county system adopted by County Council this year.

Four applications were received for the position, Messrs. Early, Jack Harrison and Frank Petch tendering at \$1800 and Clarence Benham at \$1500.

RETURNS FROM SERVING WITH ST. JOHN AMBULANCE

Going overseas in September, 1945, she has risen to the rank of A/Lady Cadet Officer, which corresponds to an army rank of 2nd lieutenant, being one of four of the original detachment of 27 to win her promotion.

In England, Mrs. Sharpe was stationed at the Winford Orthopaedic Emergency Hospital near Bristol, where she was the only Canadian member of the staff. The patients were mainly British, with a small scattering of Poles, Italians and Germans. Mrs. Sharpe reports that the food situation in Britain is grim — even worse than during the war, but in spite of this she gained a few pounds and is looking extremely fit and healthy. She returned from England on the Scotia.
