HALTON BOYS COMPETE AT INTERNATIONAL

The Victory International Plowing Match, held in Huron County, October 15 to 18 inclusive, broke all past records from the standpoint of tractor plowmen and general attendance. Notwithstanding somewhat unfavorable weather conditions the Port Albert (Airfield the scene of the 1946 event, was the mecca for rural Ontario. According to reports all highways in the area were congested and traffic had to move at a snail's pace for a distance of 12 to 15 miles from headquarters in all directions. In contrast to pre-war contests, tractor classes were by far the more popular with as high as 71 tractor plowmen in one class and 25 or 30 more anxious to enter in the same class if tractor outfits could have been secured.

Halton was represented by a goodly number of her crack plowboys. While we have been unable to secure a complete report, we understand that numbered among them were Keith Merry, Hornby and Chas. Hunter, Georgetown, who represented Halton in the inter-county class for boys under 20 years. They placed fifth as a team, in competition with 16 counties competing. In the inter-county event with walking plows for boys of similar age, Halton was represented by Clark Armstrong and Gordon Ferguson of Nassagaweya Township, who placed 8th as a team in competition with some twelve other counties. In the senior classes, Harry Picket of Hornby placed third in at least two events; Harvey Nurse of Georgetown and Harold Ferguson of Rockwood were in the prize money on at least two or three occasions each. Other Halton plowmen who were in action but about whom we were unable to secure complete reports at time of going to press were Claud Picket and Don Ferguson, Georgetown; Spencer Wilson, Norval; Jack Marchmont, Hornby; Jack Taylor, Freeman; and Frank Hall, Streetsville.

Two of the highlights of the big Match were the Esso Tractor Class, sponsored by Imperial Oil Co., and the Salada Tea Class for Walking Plows. In both classes the first and second prize winners were awarded free trips to Great Britain. In the Esso Tractor Class the two trip winners were Fred Timbers, of Stouffville and Alex Black of Guelph while in the Salada Tea Class the first and second prize winners were Floyd Steckley Stouffville, and Austin Nairn of Munroe.

The next event of interest for those who enjoy seeing or participating in plowing events will be Halton's little International which is scheduled for the Wm Near farm, near Hornby, on Thursday, October 31st. A \$795 prize list is offered and this together with an outstanding display of farm machinery and demonstrations ensures a record attendance.
