Halton Swine Team Wins Provincial Championship

The provincial inter-club competitions for Ontario Club Members in dairy cattle, beef cattle, swine, poultry, grain, potatoes and clothing, were held at the Ontario Agriculture College, Guelph. 148 teams of two members each participated in the day's programme. These young people represented the 8437 young people enrolled in the 807 clubs organized in Ontario in 1946. Halton was represented by six teams in all, two being in dairy cattle, two in grain, and one each in both swine and clothing.

In the swine project, with 24 counties represented, the Halton team of Fraser McNabb, Georgetown, and Keith Merry, Hornby, won top honours. As a result, they hold the Farmer Magazine Trophy, emblematic of the Provincial Championship for the ensuing twelve months. Incidentally, Fraser McNabb was the high man of the competition, with a score of 530½ points out of a possible 600. These two young men will now represent Ontario in the Inter-Provincial Club Competitions to be held at the Royal Winter Fair, on Nov. 11th.

The Grain Club project brought out 21 teams, and here the Halton Grain Club Team of Carlo Toccalino of Bronte, and Douglas Currie, of Georgetown, placed second to Brant County, the winner of the competition. Carlo Toccalino was the second high man of the competition, with a score of 533 out of a possible 600. Halton's second team composed of Geo. Wilson of Georgetown, and Victor Starrett of Glen Williams, representing the Halton Galore Barley Club, placed tenth in the same contest.

In the Dairy Cattle project, with 38 teams competing, the Milton Holstein Calf Club was represented by Douglas Alexander of Georgetown, and Gordon Darby, of Rockwood, while the Halton Jersey Calf Club was represented by James Devlin of Milton, and Tom Alderson of Hornby. While neither team achieved top honours, we understand they made an excellent showing in this strong competition.

Girls' Clothing Clubs also participated in the day's programme. Top honours were won by a team representing the Vellore Club of York County. Halton's team representing the Ashgrove Club, was composed of the Misses Jessie and Mae Wingfield, and they too made a most creditable and excellent performance.

In short, the twelve young people participating from Halton proved themselves worthy representatives of their fellow Club members, and the County of Halton. Our sincere congratulations are extended not only to Fraser McNabb and Keith Merry on the honours they won for themselves and the County of Halton, but also to all Halton representatives, for a job well done.

NEW AIR CONNECTIONS BENEFIT WIDE AREA OF WESTERN ONT.

In line with his policy to provide continuous improvement of the Air Mail service, Hon. Ernest Bertrand, K. C., M. P., Postmaster General announces the inauguration of a special train to plane connection via a new Motor Vehicle Service between Malton Station, and Malton Airport on October 28th. This service will gain up to a full day in delivery to Western Canada and one-half day to Maritime cities for air mail from several western Ontario centres. The gain will be effected by the transfer of Air Mails from the Goderich - Stratford - Toronto train at Malton Station, to the Motor Vehicle Service direct to Malton Airport.

Among the points to benefit directly will be Goderich, Tavistock, Stratford, Kitchener, Waterloo, Georgetown, Galt, Brampton, Guelph and the area northwest of Guelph.

Air mail posted at Georgetown by 9.30 a.m. connects with afternoon planes out of Malton and that mailed by 1.10 p.m. with the night planes.

Similarly Air Mail posted in Victoria and Vancouver in early morning, Edmonton in the forenoon; in Calgary, Regina, Saskatoon and Moose Jaw in the early afternoon and in Winnipeg in the evening, should connect with the train leaving Malton Station at 8.13 a.m. the following day for delivery in the above area of Western Ontario in the forenoon and afternoon, a gain of almost 1 day.
