ANTIQUARY EXHIBIT FEATURES ARTS AND CRAFTS DISPLAY

The sale of goods made by members of the Arts and Crafts of Georgetown again drew a large attendance to the Oddfellows Hall last Saturday. Buyers came not only from town but from Acton, Brampton, Ouelph, and Toronto. There was a great variety in the articles exhibited and offered for sale, with woven and knitted goods predominating, felt work, painted pottery, toys and dolls.

A new feature this year was an antique exhibit, with these articles displayed in the tea room in the basement of the building. Contributors to this exhibit included Ward Riddell, Nelson Stark, Spencer Wilson, J. A. Willoughby, Mrs. Victor King and A. M. Porter, Ouelph. The latter showed a coverlet made in 1790 by his great-grandmother. Among the numerous antiques were candle moulds, an 1817 lantern, North West Rebellion spear, wreaths, made of feathers and wool, pepper grinder, hand sewing machine, a wooden mallet made in the Scotch Block in 1837, and a potato masher brought from Ireland in 1833. A pewter communion cup from the old log church built in 1824, a collection plate from the 7th Line church, long handled frying pan brought to Canada by a U.E. Loyalist in 1800, a 180-year old English dinner gong, a wool winder and a quilt pan were other articles which caught the eye.

The Arts and Crafts group, unique in Ontario towns, has had a rapid growth since its inauguration some five or six years ago. Much of the credit or its success belongs to Mrs. M. H. Meyer and Mrs. A. G. M. Ervyns who were instrumental in organizing it.
