

# Capacity Crowd at Gregory for High School Commencement

Georgetown High School Commencement held last Thursday evening in Gregory Theatre drew its usual morethan-capacity crowd, to witness the presentation of scholastic and athletic awards for 1946 and to enjoy excellent musical ententalnment, both vocal and instrumental, as well as a good

one-act drama. Mr. M. H. Moyer, Chairman of the High School Board, congratulated the school on its excellent academic standing in the province. Georgetown's everage of passes was over 80 per cent, while the provincial average was around 75 per cent. Mr. Moyer also urged all citizens to give serious thought to the High School Area plan now afoot in north Halton, whereby the High Schools in Milton, Acton and Georgetown would be abolished, and a new combined High School and Vocational School be built near Speyside. This system has already been adopted in the southern end of the county.

The High School Olee Club, Girls' Choir, Orchestra and Boys' Choir under the direction of their musical instructor Mr. W. E. Capps, sang some first rate choral numbers. Ken Harrison and Ralph Peck took the solo parts in 'Stout-Hearted Men," and "The Riff Song", respectively. Miss Marion Hepburn's solo "Break of

Dawn," Kenneth Harrison's solo, "Duna," and the girls quartette "Barcarolle" were all beautifully sung. The girls of First Form and Third Form did two very pretty dance numbers, a folk dance and ballet. Marion Hepburn and Kenneth Harrison played a piano duet "Tea for Two," and Kenneth also played during the short intermission which preceded the one-act play "The Crimson Cocoanut."

The play was a comedy, centring around a cocoanut which concealed a time bomb with which foreign agents' hoped to blow up the Bank of England. It was a good performance by the following cast: Norm Long, Chif Taylor, Doug Latimer, Peggy Kelly, Henk De Vries and Jean Chester. David Williams and Bob Leslie looked after the stage properties.

Dirk Van Vliet, winner of the R. B. Foulis Shield for the highest standing in Grade XIII, delivered the valedictory address, expressing very suitably the sentiments of the graduating class.

Principal J. L. Lambert presented the prizes for highest academic standing and proficiency prize, in the unavoidable absence of Mr. Ralph Ross, the previous Principal. Mr. Lambert expressed regret at the departure of Mr. Ross from town and said that his well-beloved personality would be greatly missed by everyone. He also thanked organizations and individuals who made the prizes possible.
