Education Important in Hockey Career, Says Gus Bodnar

Don't neglect your studies if you want to get anywhere in the sports world, was the advice given by Maple Leaf hockey star Gus Bodnar to the boys who were present at the Father and Son evening last Friday night. Mr. Bodnar, who is on the injured list at present, was the only team member able to make the trip as this season's heavy schedule has forced the Maple Leaf management to curtail out-of-town trips on the evening before a game. Bob Goldham, Georgetown's contribution to professional hockey, was thus unable to be present as expected.

Giving some pointers on how to make the big-time, Gus stressed good skating and stick-handling as two of the most important assets. He described how Lorne Carr had perfected his shot by summer practice in the basement of his home, and then told of the intensive practice which a professional team had in passing.

He described an out-of-town trip of the Maple Leafs, from the time the team climbed on the sleeper until the night of the game. Montreal, he said, was the toughest town for an outside team to play in, as the fans there were strictly for the home team. Chicago was also a tough spot, with 19,000 fans jammed in and all for the Black Hawks. In both these cities there is considerable throwing of articles on the ice and in Chicago he had seen such things as dead rats, handfuls of warm pennies, programs, ticker tape and face powder. The Chicago rink also has an organist and a number of "theme songs" for the players of both teams, all of which add spice to the hockey game.

SADNESS IN HOME AS BABY FOUND DEAD
