HERE IS HOW YOU CAN HELP

IN THE HOME Eliminate all Christmas decorative lighting until Saturday, December 21st, and again after January 1st, 1947.

Turn off lights when not required.

Use a minimum number of lights in the living-room, consistent with good vision.

Use electrically heated water sparingly and check leaking hot water taps.

Do not use range elements on "high" when a lower heat will serve, and turn off all elements as soon as possible.

Cook oven meals as often as possible and avoid the unnecessary use of surface elements.

Turn off verandah and other outside lights.

Turn off all small appliances as soon as possible.

Do not use electric air heaters and grates.

IN STORES AND OFFICES Eliminate all Christmas decorative lighting before December 21st, 1946, and again after January 1st, 1947.

Eliminate the use of electricity for signs and store windows from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Turn off all lights when not required.

Use electrically heated water sparingly and check leaking hot water taps.

Do not use electric air heaters.

IN INDUSTRIES switch from day to night operations wherever practicable.

Turn off factory and office lights when not needed.

Turn off motor-driven machines when not required and effect other savings wherever possible.

Avoid the use of all non-essential outdoor lighting.

Do not use electric space heaters.

CANADIAN JERSEY CHAMPION SELLS OUTSTANDING CALF

Gerald Graham, of Georgetown, Ontario, reports that he has sold an outstanding bull calf to the well-known Jersey Breeder, F. C. H. Bent, Omeemee, Ontario.

This young bull is the son of Mr. Graham's senior herd sire, Brampton Pinn B. Aim, that was reserve grand champion at Milton in 1945. He is a son of one of the senior herd sires at Brampton, Brampton Pinnacle Best, a bull that is classified Excellent and whose first daughter to sell at Auction was sold for \$3600.00 and his daughters are now finishing splendid records. The dam of Mr. Graham's herd sire is Brampton Almbella, a cow classified Excellent with a nice record, and was imported from Jersey Island, where she was twice champion.

The dam of the bull that Mr. Bent gets is Royalist Ruby, one of the outstanding cows in the Graham herd that classified Very Good. She was first prize cow in milk at Milton in 1944 and a member of the first prize get of sire at Milton in 1943. She has a Gold Medal record of 11,172 lbs. of milk, 811 lbs. of fat, 5.47 per cent in 305 days on two times milking and several other records. She is a full sister to the Canadian champion butterfat producer in her class from 1939 to 1943, Royalist Seaside Tess, with 10,106 lbs. of milk, 657 lbs. of fat, with an average test of 6.5 per cent in 365 days at 2 years of age. Ruby is a daughter of Mr. Graham's Superior sire Brampton Favorite Royalist, one of the great cows in the Graham herd, with a five year old Gold Medal record of 11,989 lbs. of milk, 640 lbs. of fat in 305 days with an average test of 5.38 per cent. She also has several other high records.

INCREASES RECORD

The Jersey cow Fairy Raleigh's Zana, 71114, owned by Featherstone Brothers of Oakville, Ontario, has completed her eleventh record at thirteen years of age of 9,736 lbs. of milk, 517 lbs. of fat with an average test of 5.31 per cent. This brings Zana's total

production to date to 134, 140 lbs. of milk, 7,330 lbs. of fat, making her the Canadian Champion living long distance cow of the breed in Ontario, and the third highest life time producer of the breed in the Dominion. Zana has again freshened and is busy doing her best to win over the two former champions.
