ANGLERS AND HUNTERS SEE ARCHERY AND CASTING EXHIBITION, CONSERVATION FILMS

The first public meeting sponsored by the Halton Anglers and Hunters Association was held in the Georgetown Arena last Thursday night when members and their friends were treated to exhibitions of bait and fly casting, archery and a number of conservation films shown by Major P. K. Ketcheson, secretary of the Carling Conservation Club.

The exhibitions were staged by members of the Hamilton Anglers and Hunters Association, and despite the low tides and lights which were a hindrance to casting, they put on a fine show. Those present included Henry Hanson, archery section chairman, R. Hannam, past president of the club and secretary-treasurer of the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, Chas. E. (Chic) Hannam, membership secretary-treasurer, A. E. Horrocks, Canadian casting champion, Stan Young, Jr., casting champion, Chuck Martin and Eog. White, chairman and secretary of the casting section, Angus McLean and Len White. Also present were Don Sutherland, game overseer of Peel County and D. Hitchcox, Halton overseer, who pledged his full support in the restocking of fish and game in the county.

Henry Hanson put on a fine display of archery. This fall he shot a buck deer with the strong bow, and the arrow which passed through the heart went twenty feet beyond the deer. Mr. Hanson makes his own bows and arrows, as well as split bamboo rods and trout flies by the thousands. He is one of the few in Canada fortunate enough to be in possession of Tonkin cane used in the making of rods.

A test between the high-powered 35 Remington rifle and the arrow was very interesting. The bullets failed to go through a can of sand while the arrows passed through to the other side. That's one for readers to ponder.

Conservation films shown by Major Ketcheson and Len Walsh of the Carling Conservation Club included: Mountain sheep and moose, Pheasant Shooting, Bass Fishing, Tarpon Fishing and Saltfish Fishing. Years of

hard work is required to make these pictures, especially those of mountain animals. A film about the life of the Moose is now in the making and will take three or four years to complete.

So successful was the evening that the club executive are hoping to have the Hamilton Club back again in the future under more favorable conditions. Major Ketcheson also informed the group that he would be glad to come again at any time with further conservation films.

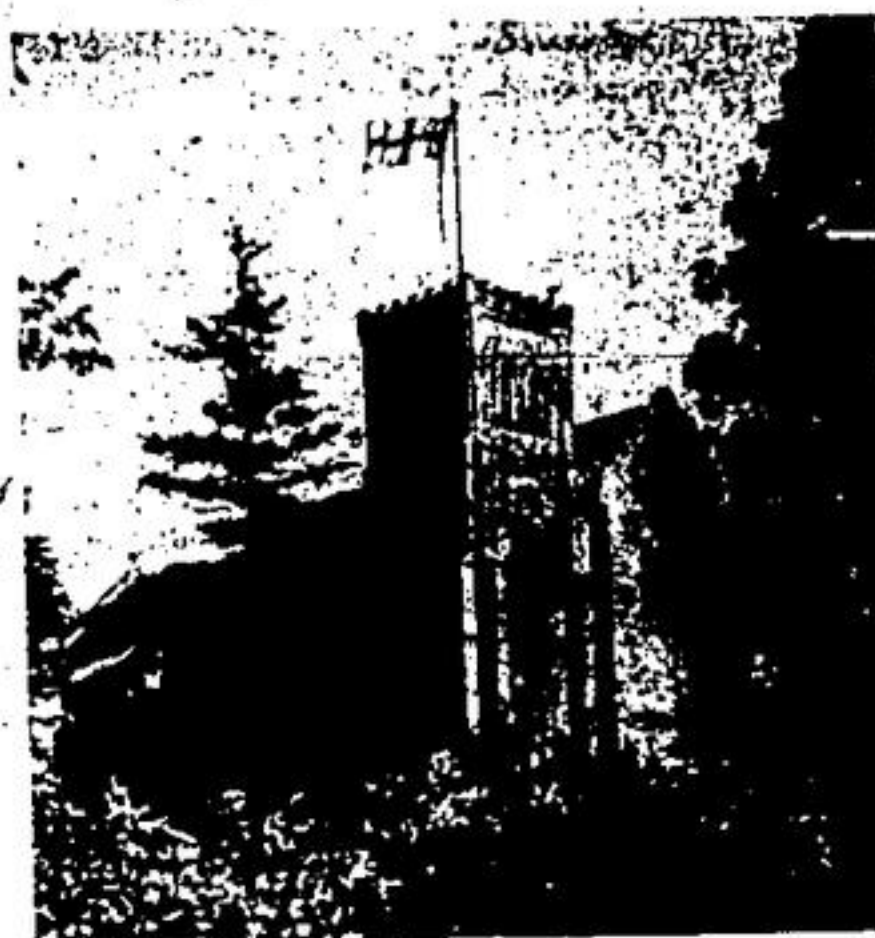

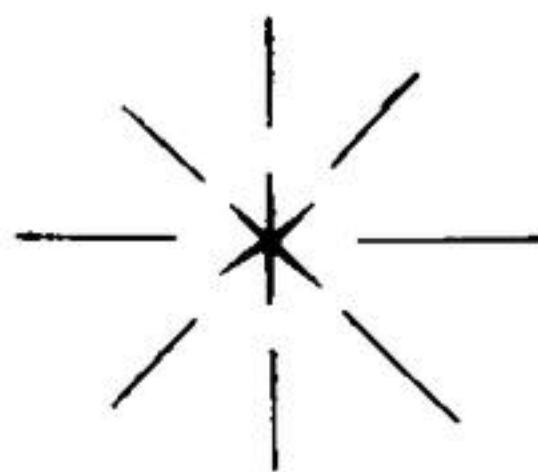
