J. A. Elliott Elected President At Plowmen's Annual Meeting

The annual Meeting of the Halton Plowmen's Association was held in the Farmers' Bldg., Milton, on Saturday evening, December 14th. This organization which came into being in 1891, has served Halton agriculture well in the past 55 years. In no year has it been more active than in 1946. The secretary-treasurer's report revealed a membership of 124, and an expenditure in connection with the year's activities of \$784.17. In co-operation with the Halton Junior Farmers, a junior match was held last June, and two teams were selected to represent Halton in the inter-county events with tractors and walking plows at the International.

Their Annual Match held the latter part of October was without doubt the most outstanding of any ever held in Halton, and according to J. A. Carroll, secretary of the Ontario Plowmen's Association, and guest speaker on Saturday evening last, one of the top matches held in the province.
