

Ontario Panoramas
Broadcasts From
Old Town Hall

Georgetown was on the air last Friday when Willard's "Ontario Panoramas" was broadcast from the Old Town Hall. The program, which featured Gordon Sinclair, Alan Savage and a group of local "great stars" is heard from 9 to 9:30 p.m. over Toronto station CFRB. Just as the show went on the air, there was a hydro interruption which lasted for two or three minutes and the opening commercials were read by flashlight — the first time this had happened in over three years and 70 programs featuring Messrs. Sinclair and Savage.

The show, which is unrebroadcast, is composed of interviews with a number of local people, the two directors taking turns in interviewing. First at the mike were Mr. Sinclair and Mayor-Elect Joseph C. Gibbons who was asked why Georgetown had two of everything—town halls, bands,

hockey teams, etc. Mr. Gibbons explained how in depression days, so many transients had been lodged in the Old Town Hall that it had even forced the Council to meet elsewhere. He gave some good publicity for the Lorne Spots Band and the Girls Pipe Band and the interview ended with some repartee about hair cutting.

Mr. Savage introduced Mrs. M. H. Moyer, who explained the local Arts & Crafts group which she was instrumental in establishing a few years ago. Mrs. Moyer described their home as a "hobby farm" where the family does only the things they like best

but make them pay. She makes many of her own dyes from vegetables and other materials.

The Herald's "weather man," Prof. H. L. Huttt was next, with Gordon Sinclair finding out things about his interesting life. Mr. Huttt established the Horticulture Department at OAC and taught in it for 21 years. His students included four who later became preachers — Drury, Nixon and Henry of Ontario and Bracken of Manitoba. Mr. Huttt received the \$50 cheque which the Willard's company donated to the Lions Club for sponsoring the show.

Art Wilson, on the road as an electrical traveller for over fifty years, told Mr. Savage some of the interesting things about Smith & Stone, Ltd. The company carries some 2000 electrical items. Clay is purchased from Quebec and Virginia. Mr. Wilson, who admitted smoking fifteen to twenty cigars a day, was the first man who had been on the show who smoked a cigar during his interview.

Pharos Vannatter answered questions posed by Mr. Sinclair about the Dominion Seed House which imports from and ships seeds to all parts of the world. The business started in 1928 in a room in the home of the present owner, W. F. Bradley. Among the most valuable in the 1000 varieties of seeds handled are double petunias, some of which are worth twenty times their weight in gold.

Those interviewed all received gift boxes of Willard's Chocolates. Gate receipts of \$32 and the \$50 cheque will be divided equally between the Lions Club and the Recreational Council. The program will be heard next week from Colborne.
