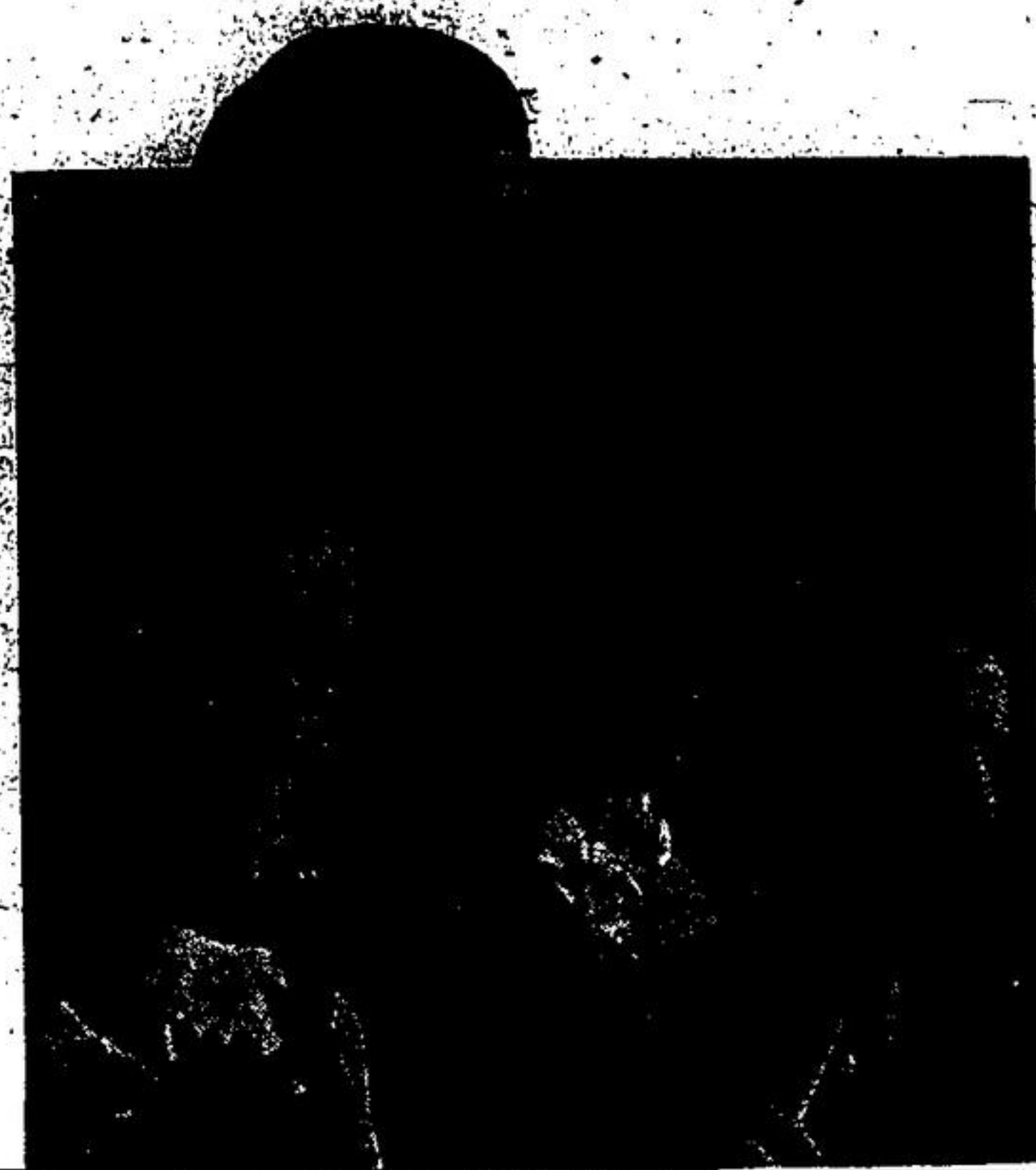

### SERIOUSLY INJURED IN DUFFERIN ST. PLANE CRASH

Charles Stockford, 34-year-old Georgetown native, was seriously injured on Sunday in the crash of a De Havilland Chipmunk plane. The crash occurred on the farm of Thomas Bows on Dufferin Street south of No. 7 Highway, within a mile of Mr. Stockford's farm home at Downsview. He is in Toronto Western Hospital with a fractured skull and other injuries.

Alan Tierney, 18, who witnessed the crash, said the small, all-metal craft was in a tailspin, diving straight for the snow-covered field when it partially levelled off about 25 feet above the ground. The propeller dug into the snow, then the plane bounced and travelled about 100 yards. One wheel rammed through the wing and there was considerable damage to the fuselage. The pilot struck his head on the windscreen.

The accident ended a routine test flight of the aircraft which was to have been one in a shipment of planes to the Argentine Government. Witnesses said the pilot had been through a series of aerobatics and that the engine appeared to fall just before the craft went into a tailspin.

Mr. Stockford, who is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Stockford, George Street, left his position as principal of Uxbridge Public School shortly after war's outbreak to serve, first as a civilian instructor and later as a member of the RCAF, where he rose to the rank of Squadron Leader.

### HERE ARE SOME OF THE WAYS YOU CAN HELP

#### IN THE HOME

- Turn off lights when not required.
- Use the minimum number of lights in the living-rooms, consistent with good vision.
- Use electrically heated water sparingly and check leaking hot water taps.
- Do not use range elements on "high" when a lower heat will serve, and turn off all elements as soon as possible.
- Cook oven meals as often as possible and avoid the unnecessary use of surface elements.
- Turn off verandah and other outside lights.
- Turn off all small appliances as soon as possible.
- Do not use electric air heaters and grates.

#### IN STORES AND OFFICES

- Eliminate the use of electricity for signs and store windows from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- Turn off all lights when not required.
- Use electrically heated water sparingly and check leaking hot water taps.
- Do not use electric air heaters.

#### IN INDUSTRIES

- Switch from day to night operations wherever practicable.
- Turn off factory and office lights when not needed.
- Turn off motor-driven machines when not required and effect other savings wherever possible.
- Avoid the use of all non-essential outdoor lighting.
- Do not use electric space heaters.
