LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,
Georgetown celebrated the centenary of the inception of a week of prayer last week, and services were held in each of the four Protestant churches Monday evening a prayer meeting was held in Knox Presbyterian Church conducted by Rev. C. C. Cochrane, and a sermon was given by Rev. R. C. Todd, the theme being the living organism "Our Lord Himself". The living "bread" it was concise, interesting and instructive.

On Tuesday a prayer meeting was held in the Baptist Church, conducted by Rev. J. E. Ostrom; a short time was given for social prayer, and Mrs. Ostrom sang a solo; a very interesting sermon was given by Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson, showing how we may appear in the sight of our Lord, and how sometimes the sins of "Omission" are greater than the sins of commission.

On Wednesday a prayer meeting was held in the United Church, conducted by Rev. R. C. Todd, and Rev. J. E. Ostrom gave a sermon on "The Church, Its Builder and Founder" who was also its "foundation" and its "Head". Our Lord Himself. His sermon was well planned and very interesting.

On Thursday a prayer meeting was held in St. George's Anglican church which took the form of evening with special prayers for the occasion and was backed by the choir. Archdeacon Thompson conducted the service and the sermon was given by Rev. C. C. Cochrane. It was a lecture on the unity of the church. How the Protestants lost out and suffered by the union, and now are onlookers with experience at the present time. He left the thought that the church is the "nation", the "people" and not the building owned by any one of the denominations.

The front pews of all the churches were empty and the few people who did attend were scattered in the back seats.

The collection plates were NOT passed and while the weather was cold, it was not too cold for the people who did attend and one wonders where the rest of the members of the four churches were. There is nowhere that one could gain more than at a prayer meeting, and we ask, "What can be the reason that we do not give our Protestant ministers more support?"

Each one must have worked to prepare for these special services, and must have been somewhat discouraged.

What are we going to use as an ally when we stand before our Lord, to give account of our lives. The time is getting very short.

LOCAL HOLSTEIN WINS ALL-CANADIAN AWARD

Luzerne Elizabeth May Sovereign, owned by J. W. and E. H. Carney, Georgetown, has been named Reserve All-Canadian Junior Yearling heifer. She was third prize Junior Yearling at the Royal Winter Fair and is a member of the Get of Sire by Montvic Rag Apple Sovereign that was first at the Royal and received Honorable Mention for All-Canadian.

In the Junior Judging Competition sponsored by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada in connection with the All-Canadian contest, William G. Revell, Campbellville and Bill Laidlaw, Norval, each scored a total of 134 points to place them in a tie for 20th place out of a total of 482 Calf Club boys and girls in the Dominion that took part. J. Craig Alexander, Georgetown, scored 122 points as did David Pelletier, Milton. Audrey Rinehart, Campbellville also qualified for a prize with a score

of 120 points. The All-Canadian Contest is the climax of the show season for Holstein breeders in Canada. Prize winners at the various fairs and exhibitions compete for national honors through the medium of photographs, the actual selections in the various classes being made by a Committee composed of the various judges at these fairs. In each of the regular show classes, Honorable Mention is also given. This year forty-five breeders in various parts of the Dominion shared the awards, although the majority came to Ontario. The contest is sponsored by the Holstein Friesian Journal.
