Accepted with regret the resignation of W. G. Marshall as chief constable and other offices effective January 31st.

—Defeated an amendment that the resignation be not accepted until a committee had interviewed him to ascertain the reason for his resignation.

—Heard Inspector E. T. Doyle explain the Provincial Police system for municipalities and decided to enter an agreement with that body to take over policing duties here.

(Recorded vote, movers Armstrong and Goodlet; Ritchie and Lyons voting against.)

—Appointed Standing Committees for 1947.

(Moved by Hale, Herbert.)

—In response to a personal protest by Mrs. W. Diggins regarding charging of extra water rates to their house, part of which is sub-let, left it with the Water Committee to adjust her bill and continue that way until some possible changes are made in the by-law.
