**FOUR MILL EXEMPTION GRANTED TO CERTAIN FARM LANDS**

For the first time in several years, the question of a 4-mill tax exemption for farm lands within the municipality was thoroughly reviewed at Thursday's Council meeting. Last year the matter came into prominence when it was found that the municipality had not been following the time regulations set forth in the Municipal Act which requires the exemption to be given two months before the tax rate is struck, and no exemptions were granted. Reeve Magrath, at that time not a Council member, had raised strenuous objections, claiming that for 26 years it had been a matter of routine for a 4-mill exemption to be given and that he had been told many years back that it was not necessary to apply for this exemption. This year letters claiming the exemption were received from the reeve and from S. W. Orr.

Mayor Gibbons and Mr. Goodlet both thought it was time Council followed more closely the purpose of the Act, which is to grant tax relief for properties which do not get a fair share of civic services such as water service, garbage collection and fire protection. A list of farm lands had been prepared and each property was discussed, the following being granted the 4-mill exemption: A. Hyde, Mrs. George Beckitt, Mr. Collins, A. MacLaren, Meadowcroft Growers, Georgina Thompson, Jack Toxt, E. B. Tyers, J. A. Willoughby and George Leslie.
