C. L. S. PALMER ELECTED PRESIDENT HALTON CROP IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION

The Annual Meeting of the Halton Crop Improvement Association had a capacity house at the Court House, Milton, on Saturday, January 4th, notwithstanding heavy roads, blocked lanes, and disrupted telephone and hydro systems in many sections of Halton. W. E. Breckon, of Freeman, a past president of both the Halton and Ontario Crop Improvement Associations, was the guest speaker. Mr. Breckon congratulated the Halton association on their active programme and in particular on having the largest attendance of any of the eight County association annual meetings recently attended. Mr. Breckon, in his address on agricultural conditions in Great Britain, Denmark, and southern Sweden, delighted his audience with the clear and comprehensive picture which he presented of conditions and marketing prospects for Canadian agricultural products in those countries. The Canadian farmer has a lot to learn from the farmers of Great Britain, Denmark and southern Sweden, declared Mr. Breckon. The average yield of winter wheat in Denmark is 75 bus. per acre, and of oats 150 bus., he stated.

The Secretary's report, presented by J. E. Whitelock, listed a total of fifteen projects sponsored by the Association in 1946. A number of these were reported on by the following local co-operators - Gerald Graham, Georgetown, and Wm. Booth, Milton, who were winners in the Long Term Pasture competition sponsored by the Association; H. B. Burkholder, Freeman, winner of the 50 bushel Winter Wheat Club - his yield was reported as 62.8 bushel per acre; Victor Hall, Hornby; on 2-4 D Weed Killers; Lykke DeVries of Georgetown, on his experience in growing 95 bushel per acre of Husking Corn - this incidentally was the top yield in the Esquing Husking Corn competition; John Bird and Douglas Currie, of Georgetown, on Grain Variety Tests; Robt. Miller, Georgetown, on Broome Grass, as part of a hay-pasture mixture.

A T. Woodley, Milton, President of the Halton Association for the past two years was chairman. It was announced that the annual Halton Seed Fair and Bacon Show would be held at Milton, on March 14th and 15th. The election of officers resulted as follows:

WHILE THIS column hasn't really got into the hockey spirit until now, we notice that Georgetown is sporting a couple of high calibre teams this year. Haven't had a look at the Juniors to date, but understand they are a well-balanced team and may yet give the league-leading Oakville a taste for group honours. One thing certain, though, is that this year's Intermediates have not lost any of last season's high quality - and are now taking over where they left off. Of course, we read the papers occasionally and find that the Acton scribe and the Fergus scribe have been giving "Sideliner" a "going over" due to those "nice boys" from Toronto Mercantile who are giving us their services so that we might have this "fine calibre team." Not that Acton, and Fergus too, wouldn't be glad to have a few good players a little closer to home, but Georgetown seems to be situated as "inconvenient" for them to do so. However, we notice on the Acton line-up that Grant Gillespie isn't just what you would call a home-town lad.

HOWEVER, the OHA, seems to have decided a lot of things lately which will have a bearing on the finish of the group schedule. Georgetown has been placed in 'A' Company if and when they win the group, and it looks as though Milton are in the same category. This is due to playing the outside help, but nevertheless Georgetown should be able to give a good account of themselves even in this higher grouping. Milton doesn't seem to be winning very much no matter what way you take it. Acton too, had the choice of playing Harold Mooney and a couple of other players from the Mercantile loop or stay in the 'B' grouping and have decided to stay where they are.

IN LOOKING over the league standing it looks as though Elora and Orangeville might be the weak links in the group. Elora and Fergus have a hard time trying to round out two teams in their district, while Orangeville is playing a lot of inexperienced help which should put them on a better footing for next year's team.

NOTED a few improvements at the Arena this year. This new public address system has added much for the fans' enjoyment of the game, and the new exhaust fan will do much in lessening the smoke nuisance by those who persist in "smoking at hockey games." Double doors going into the ice proper have eliminated somewhat the bottleneck here, and these improvements are appreciated. The time clock has not yet arrived, but is still promised before the season is over.

SYMPATHY is extended from the community to the Mars brothers, Elio, Esio and Leno, all on the Tanners, who were bereft of their mother last week. This necessitated the playing of an exhibition game, instead of a league game with Acton on Tuesday.

THE NEXT Intermediate game to be played here will be on Friday, Jan. 24th when Elora are visitors, and in the Junior section Acton play here, Wednesday, January 29.
