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Georgetown Defeat Ebor in Best Game of Hockey Season

Although at Tail-end of Group, Visitors' Extended League
Leaders on Soft Ice, Georgetown Punished for
Rough Tactics Fared in Second Period.

Playing before a crowd of over 800 hockey fans, Ebor and Georgetown Intermediates staged the best game of the season here last Friday night. At the end of full-time Georgetown was successful in being on the big end of an 8-6 score, although at any time the score could have been reversed. Three times during the game the score stood at a tie.

While the ice was good for the first period, although it was raining outside, both teams turned on the speed and play raced from one end of the ice to the other. It was not until half-way through the second period that the ice became heavy and slowed down the fast skating Georgetown team. Ebor was better on the defensive while the locals carried more plays in on goal, only to be turned back by some good goal-tending by Walsley. Ken Storey, Georgetown wing man, received a cut over the right eye when hit by a stick which required two stitches; and as the final whistle blew Beaumont and Rombough tangled in the corner, but were soon separated.

Nine goals were scored in the first period of the game and this kept the crowd on their toes for the entire session. Ebor took advantage of the breaks and scored twice before Georgetown got on the score sheet. The first line of Ridley, Forester and Quinn stacked up well against Hurst, Bradbury and Murdoch, with Forester being the most aggressive player on his team.

Chris opened the second frame with a chip on his shoulder and was soon whistled to the cooler for rough tactics. While he was off Ebor tied up the score. This was short lived when Birtwistle and Hurst combined on a nice effort. From this point on penalties marred the game and a steady path was beaten to the penalty box.

The score stood at 6-5 for the locals going into the third period, with Murdoch still serving a penalty. The home team outscored the visitors and the issue was closed with an 8-6 score.

Due to injuries in another game, Offson was missing from the line-up and his place was taken by Ken Storey, and Nick Parri, who was playing lacrosse in Rochester that night, was replaced by Jack Scott.

THE MILD January weather has put a crimp in some of the sport activities about town. And while on the subject we do not countenance any team injecting rough tactics into an otherwise clean game, and we thought Referee Houston handled the situation very well.

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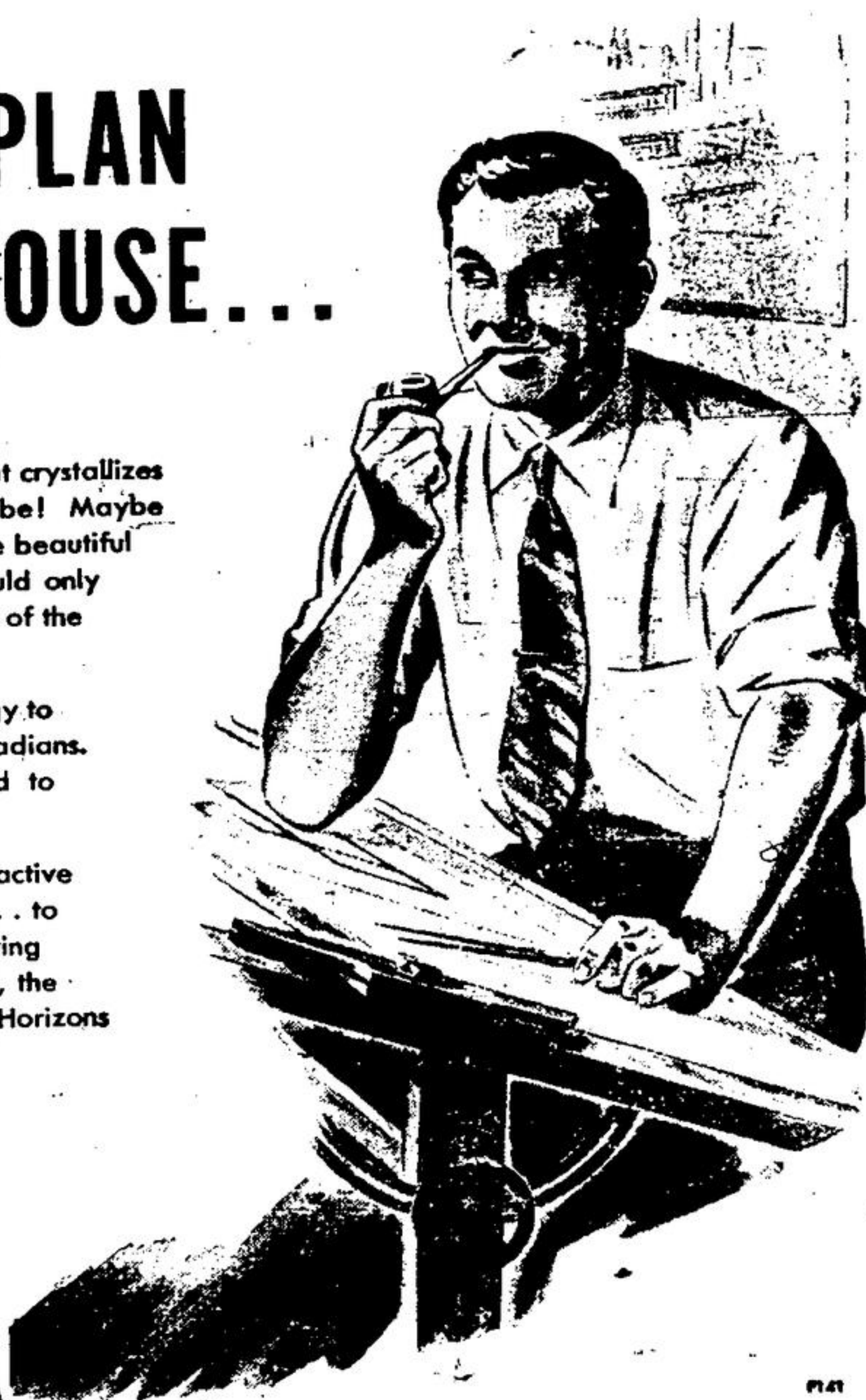
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
