RECREATION WEEK IN GEORGETOWN

Intermediates Still Out in Front Tan Acton 4-3 in Fast Game

Visitors Threw in all Available Material, but were unable to win — Milton Here Friday, Fergus on Monday.

After reading the account in the Acton Free Press of the Acton-Georgetown game in Acton the previous week it is no wonder the Acton team were confident of a win when they transferred their "high sticks" to the Georgetown arena for the return game on Friday night. However, a very disillusioned team returned home, considering themselves very lucky to get on the score sheet. The Actonites sported a full dress team while the locals started with two men short — Bradbury dressing in the second period to make things more even.

However, no matter how you look at it the veterans gave us a good game. What we lacked in "high sticks" they had it, what they lacked in goal scoring, we had it. Sure, Acton scored three goals to our four — but the first was a gift, the second a fluke, and the third, well, Marzo really scored. And all these goals came when our boys eased up in the final stages of a defensive game and failed to return the punch of the two former periods. They managed to stay "Dang" Keatner and his ruffians off quite handsly and high hopes of a third period rally died away with the sound of the gong.

Then too, the Acton team had the benefit of the refereeing — we didn't dress Houston, and his duties were taken over very capably by Pat Patterson of Toronto as referee, and Scott as linesman. No, a win wasn't in the cards, Tamers — but you were close.

The first period was the best of the game, both teams were in high gear, and Georgetown pressed the issue to the Acton end and netted three goals to put the game on ice. Birtwistle and Beaumont combined for the first while Chris was serving a penalty. Then came one of the finest goals of the game when Scott beat the whole Acton team and lodged the puck behind Evans who hadn't a chance to save. Likewise Gibson scored on a solo effort while both teams were a man short. It was a beautiful goal, as he rounded the defence and skated in close on Evans. Penalties were numerous in this period and Ilo Marzo drew a ten-minute misconduct penalty for making some unnecessary remarks to the referee.

Acton, still came back strong in the second period, and Rhodes in the Georgetown net was called on to save his team on many occasions. Ezard made the score 4-0 when he blinded the red light, and the Actonites became desperate. Their break came when Bradbury rounded his own net and passed out from the boards to centre ice where Townsley was waiting and flicked it home. The period ended with no further scoring.

Early in the third period Townsley again picked up a pass from E. Marzo and beat Rhodes to make the score 4-2. The final counter came on a break-away by E. Marzo who scored on a fine effort. The Georgetown team showed little aggressiveness in this period and were content to lay back and trust to their lead to carry them through.

First star of the game goes to Rhodes in the Georgetown net who made some sensational plays, especially when the team was shorthanded. Second star to Storey, who played a well-balanced game, at centre ice and was always a threat to the visitors. His stickhandling was clever and he passed very well. Dolly Beaumont ranks well for the third star, playing probably his best game on home ice this year.

R. H. ROBERTSON, HALTON NATIVE, DIES IN MANITOBA

Friends assembled in the United Church, Cartwright, Manitoba, on Saturday, January 16th to bid farewell to Robert Hume Robertson, who died at his home south of Cartwright the previous Wednesday at the age of 68. Mr. Robertson was born in Halton County on October 15th, 1878, and went west in 1882, where he homesteaded a few miles west of Cartwright. In 1880 he purchased the farm where he spent the rest of his life. He was keenly interested in sports and in his younger days was a keen baseball player. He was on the team known as the "Hungey Nine" a team that is still discussed in sporting circles in that district.

He served on the Council before and at the time the municipality of Cartwright was formed and was reeve of the town for several years. He was a past president of the Agricultural Society, a loyal churchman and elder in Cartwright United Church.

Surviving are his widow, formerly Annie Weldie, whom he married in 1893, four daughters, Mrs. C. E. Daly (Helena), Miss Jennie, Mrs. Lindsay Ferguson (Roberta) and Mrs. Max McEhernen (Florence), all of Winnipeg, and two sons, Alex and Donald, at home. There are eight grandchildren.

Prof. Ross Cavers to Address Halton Poultry Producers

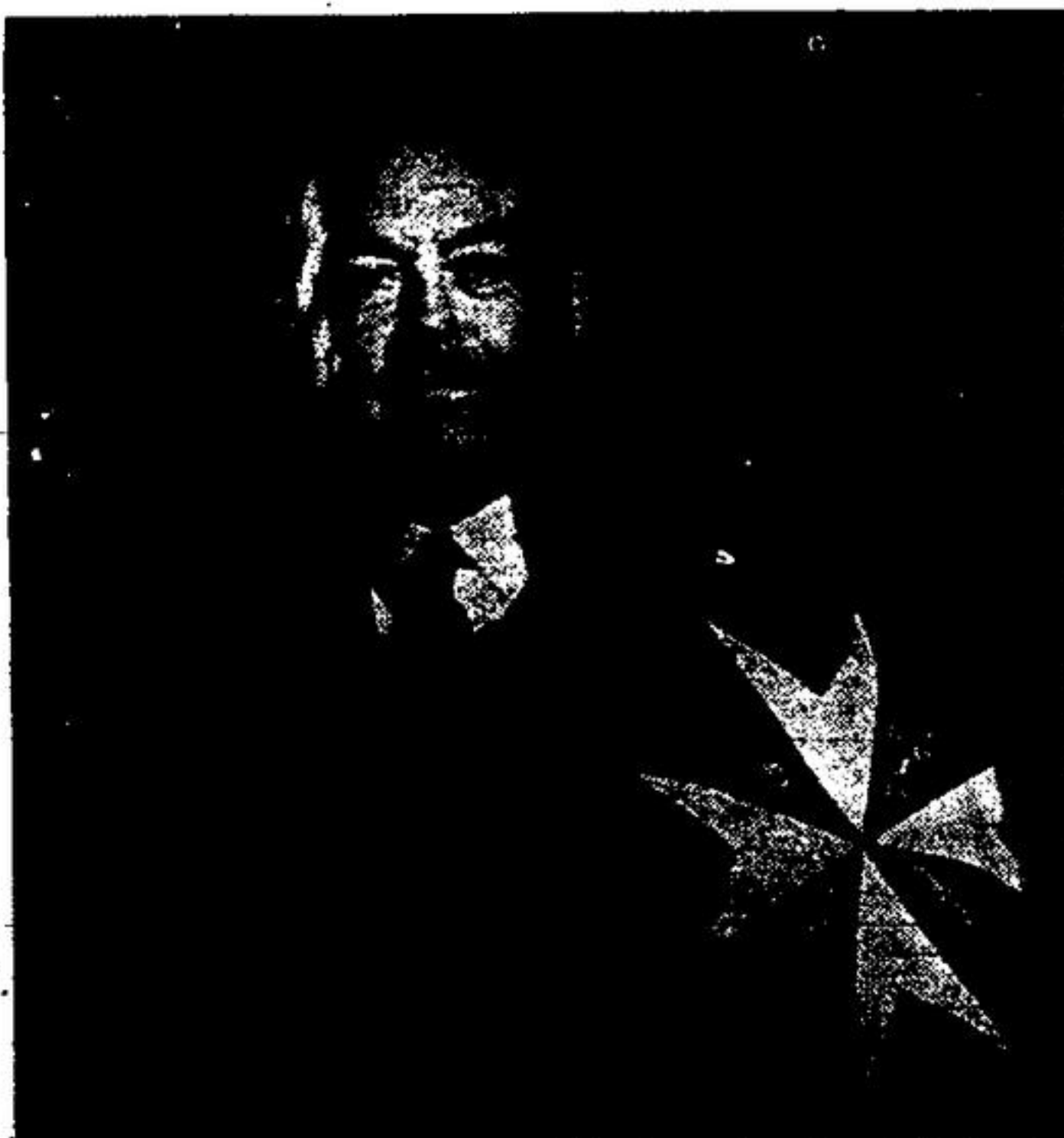
