LETTER TO THE EDITOR

February 11, 1947
Dear Editor:
The notice of the retirement of Mr. Howard Kentner from the Board of Parks Management was received with much regret by the Board, especially in view of the fact that some vast changes at the Arena were under consideration such as artificial ice and new seating, and we know of no one in town who is better qualified to talk this kind of business than Mr. Kentner.

However, the council has the power to make changes and the new member will be welcomed to his place on the board at the next meeting.
What does grieve me though is the small talk especially from people who should know better, about Mr. Kentner getting business from the Arena. I would like to point out that Mr. Kentner does not need to look for business and certainly only did certain work at the Arena under pressure from the writer and then only because he could see the necessity of such work being done at once.

In any case the Board do not consider that they come under any binding municipal ruling as to purchases and have tried to spread their business among the merchants as a whole and have, for instance, had supplies

from all of the Hardware men in town from time to time.

Mr. Kentner has done a grand job for the arena and also for the Hydro during the last few years and neither asks or expects any favours and certainly not any payment for services rendered his town. As a matter of fact, he as all other members of the Board are the type of men who could not be hired and therefore are about sick of the small talk from people who should and do know better.

Dear Editor:
Re - Georgetown Recreational Council
It seems to me that this worthy organization and its work are not understood by the great majority of our people and taxpayers. Why?

First of all the word "Recreation" is very largely a misnomer and the addition of a more enlightening word (possibly "Development", "Occupational", "Educational" would or should go a long way to change the minds of many who look upon this effort as one of amusement only, the conclusion being that games in themselves do not necessarily strengthen the mind for the serious business of life.

The brief definition of "Recreation" in Webster's Dictionary is "Refreshment of the Strength and Spirits after Tiredness — Amusement — Entertainment."
The word "Recreation", and its meaning as people understand it, is only a small branch of the work which the Georgetown Recreational Council is out to accomplish. This seems to be a handicap of first magnitude and it would seem most desirable that the highly useful pursuits of the organization be strongly featured.

There is no escaping the fact that

did suggestions that a "fun" organization is of no interest to them and that they should not be required to pay taxes to help sustain it. That word "Recreation" is largely to blame and I would like to see the harmful meaning it conveys to some, be effectively dispelled otherwise this fine and powerfully useful undertaking will disintegrate. Why not have a small chart to indicate the various branches of usefulness, including of course the proper proportions of fun and sport? If the public seems indifferent, don't blame them entirely. That word "Recreation" is quite too weak to convey the purposes of the organization.

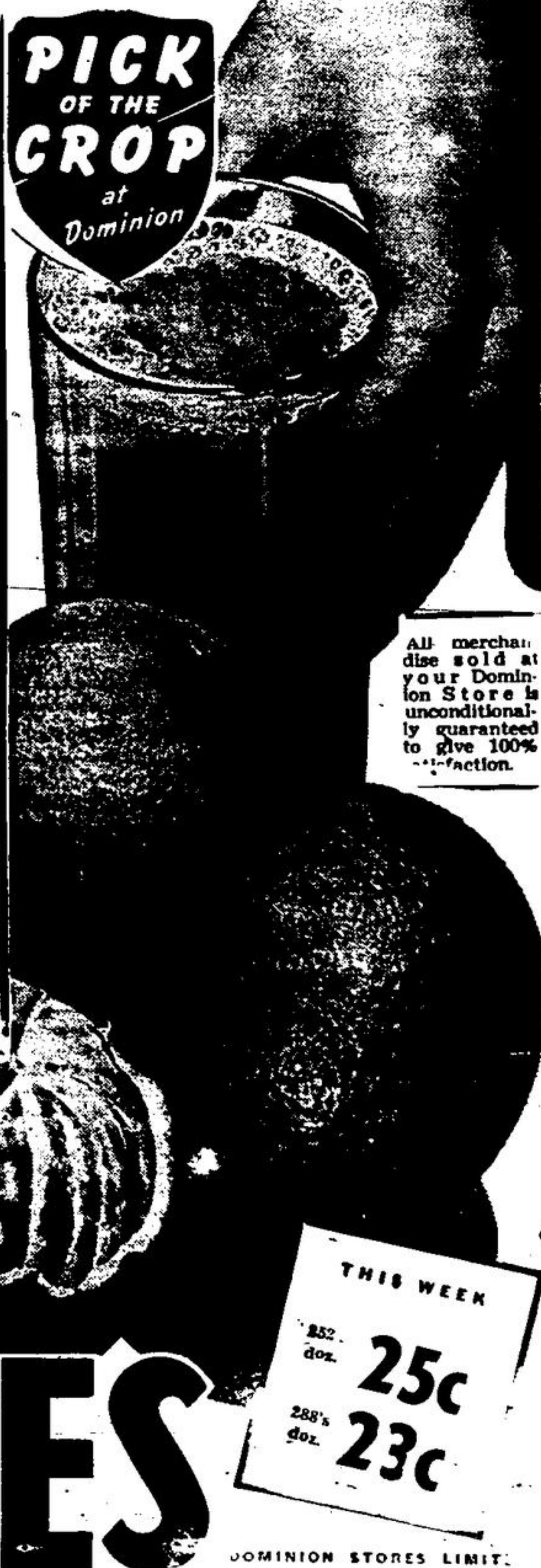
