A few minutes later, Milton spoiled Tipping's chances for a shut-out. The Norval goalie played a sensational game. A goal by Wilson at the end of the period was not counted as play had been called.

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WAS ILLNESS FATAL TO MELVILLE LE BAR

Illness contracted while serving with the Canadian army in England proved fatal to Melville N. LeBar, 27-year-old resident of Georgetown, who died in Christie Street Hospital, Toronto last Saturday. The young man had been in ill health since he was invalided home in February, 1944 and had been in hospital several times for treatment. A native of Toronto, he joined the army in March, 1941, and went overseas that September with the 11th Bty., 2nd Heavy A.A., holding the rank of gunner. He was married in July, 1944, to Myrtle Irvine of Toronto, who with their baby son, Alfred, survives. He also leaves his mother, Mrs. A. E. Colman, Georgetown, two sisters, Mrs. Paul Chantier (Dorothy) and Mrs. Donald Hill (Bernice) and a brother, Charles, all of Toronto. Funeral services from his mother's residence on William Street were conducted yesterday by his brother-in-law, Rev. Wilfrid Irvine, assisted by Rev. J. E. Ostrom. Pall-bearers were Wm. Emmerson, Jr., Arthur Norton, Harry Tait, Charles Le Bar, Paul Chantier, and Donald Hill. Interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown.
