Report of the Georgetown Public Health Nursing Service for 1946

The following is a record of some of the more interesting phases of work carried out by the Georgetown Public Health Nursing Service in 1946.

The service which is given in Georgetown is one-third of the total service given, as a similar amount of time is spent in Milton and Acton.

The following calls were made in Georgetown:
School, 100; Adult, 2; Pre-school, 11; Infant, 2. Calls to Medical Officer, Children's Aid, etc., 51.
Total calls, 175.

IMMUNIZATION
Diphtheria Toxoid

104 children received diphtheria toxoid, 26 children received the full course of 3 doses; 78 children received one reinforcing dose.

Vaccination
28 children received Smallpox vaccination. 27 of the vaccinations were positive.

Tuberculin Testing
42 pupils at the high school were tuberculin tested. All those tested were negative.

Physical Defects
The following is a record of the physical defects found during the physical examinations.

Vision 18 — 14 corrected.
Abnormal tonsils 26 — 14 corrected.
4 subsided.
Speech defects 5 — 3 improved.
Skin Disease 4.
Orthopedic Defects 18 — 5 improving.

Postural Defects 21 — 12 improving.
Dental Defects 84 — 53 corrected.
3 crippled children received special attention during the year.

High School Health Service
At the High School the pupils in Grade 9 received a full physical examination from the Medical Officer of Health. The pupils in the other grades are examined by the Public Health Nurse.

Pre School Health Service
A pre-school examination was held in June at the public school. This was for all children who would be starting to school in September. 40 children were examined by the public health nurse.

Distribution of Time
Time spent in schools, 264 hours; time spent in office work, 84 hours; time spent in clinic, 26 hours; time spent visiting, 190 hours; Time spent at meetings, etc., 8 hours.
One and a half days a week are spent in each town, with Friday afternoon free to use wherever it is needed most.
